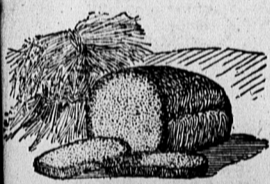

Industrial Expansion And Power Development

The application of electrical power to industry and its production on a large scale is steadily bringing about a revolution in methods of production and improvement of the mode of living throughout the Dominion. On every side the cry is heard for more speed, especially in manufacturing operations where success depends largely on keeping down costs of production of every kind. Speed in industry is obtained largely by substituting machines for manual labor wherever possible and by accelerating all mechanical operations. This speed which makes large scale production possible can only be obtained by the expenditure of much power. In addition to the industrial demand the whole trend of modern life is toward labor-saving devices in the office, factory and home, and all these add their quota to the overall demand for power. Electricity is fast becoming the universal power medium; the facility with which it can be produced, transmitted, distributed and applied make it an ideal servant, and the removal of limitations imposed by mechanical transmission has made possible enormous increases in the quantity of power which can be developed at one site. This electrical revolution has attained enormous proportions in Canada and the development of large power sites has turned out of great advantage because hydro-electric practice has made it possible by using large units to reduce the unit cost of power so much that not only has industrial development been stimulated, but a great boon has been provided for the people at large in cheap electric energy.

PIONEER ONTARIO

In the Province of Ontario there was started nearly 20 years ago a municipality owned undertaking for the Province at the lowest economic cost. At present nearly all of the cities and towns, as well as a large number of the villages and smaller communities are supplied with electrical energy through the agency of what is known as the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario. This co-operative undertaking has been singularly successful and ranks with the greatest electrical undertakings of the world. The modern development of water-power began with the last decade of the nineteenth century, by the end of which approximately 170,000 horse-power had been installed. Since then, with the exception of a short interval during the war and post war period, the rate of progress has been increasing until in 1925, 719,000 horse-power was installed, bringing the total to date to 4,230,428 horsepower, with an estimated investment in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000,000.

REMARKABLE FEATURE

Probably the most remarkable feature of the available water power resources of Canada is their distribution. For example, the provinces of Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec together contain two-thirds of the population of the Dominion and the bulk of the manufacturing industries, but with the possible exception of lignite in Manitoba, have no commercial coal resources. These same provinces have upwards of three-quarters of the water power resources, sufficient to supply a great expansion in energy demands. Again in Alberta and Saskatchewan the power resources are located away from the agricultural prairies, where industrial demands are naturally small and are located in the foothills in the northern area where the timber exists and where abundant mineral resources have always been located and are in process of development. The remaining provinces adjoin the oceans and are favorably situated to participate in sea-born trade. These also have ample water power resources for their prospective needs. British Columbia being particularly well situated in this regard.

Canada is peculiarly rich in hydro power. Two decades ago the total development amounted to 150,000 H. P. By 1910 this grew to approximately 1,000,000 h. p. At the present time the installed capacity is approximately 4,200,000 h. p. Development of Canadian water power is proceeding at a rapid pace, amounting to between 300,000 and 700,000 h. p. per year.

7-Year Old Boy Accidentally Shot By Hired Man

(Canadian Press) PETERBORO, Ont., June 9.—A threat made in fun was tragically carried out this morning when Jack Seenev, 7, only son of Melion Seenev, Cavan, was instantly killed by the charge from a shotgun in the hands of Jack Elliott, his father's hired man.

The accident occurred in the kitchen of the home, half a mile west of Ida, Elliott was changing his clothes in the bedroom adjoining the kitchen and the little lad was playing around. Elliott, who was very fond of his employer's son, picked up the shotgun and said "go on out or I'll shoot." The gun was accidentally discharged, the pellets striking the lad in the side of the head.

Members of the family said it was the first time the gun had ever been loaded when standing in the house. A jury empaneled by Dr. H. A. Turner, of Millbrook, brought in a verdict of accidental death.

Poland's Reply To Soviet Note Is Conciliatory

BERLIN, June 9.—Warsaw dispatches say the Polish government's reply to the Soviet note on the assassination of Peter Volkoff, Soviet Minister to Poland is couched in conciliatory terms. It disclaims responsibility for the crime pointing out that M. Volkoff repeatedly refused police protection on the ground that, as a well-known friend of Poland, he had nothing to fear.

George Ernest Bingley, World War Veteran, aged 37 years died at his home in Kentville, N.S. June 3rd. He was a military patient at the Kentville Sanatorium for two and a half years but spent the last three weeks of his life at his home with his wife and little daughter. He was a native of Grand Tracadie, P.E.I. His brother John Austin, also a World War Vet., was robbed and brutally murdered in Detroit, Mich. seven months ago.

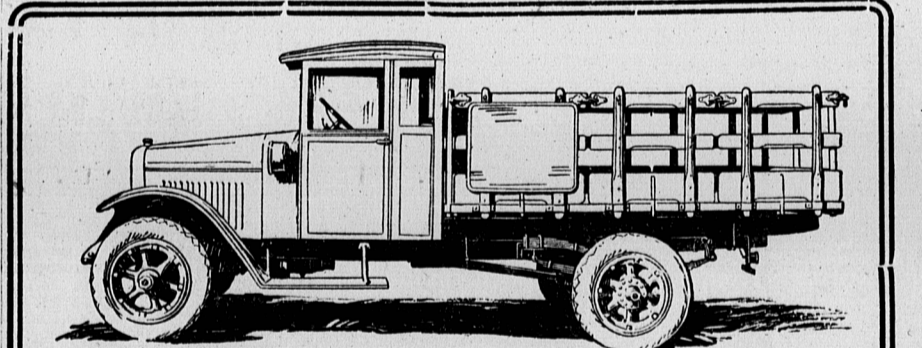
