Navy Fall Victims 18-7 In The Highest Scoring Tilt Of Season

Starting deadly passing attacks and taking full advantage of breakaways as their opponents attempted to get back into the running after a disastrous start, Gordie Drillon's Legionaires last night vaulted back into first place in the City Hockey League as they smothered the Navy under an 18-7 score in the highest scoring game of the season. Not only did the victory move the Legion team to the top of the heap but it also kept alive Prince of Wales berth, they still retaining their mathematical chance of tying the Tars for third place.

Cold weather kept the attendance down to the lowest of the season but despite the scoring orgy the fans saw a spirited battle. Trailing 5-0 before eight minutes had elapsed Navy kept plugging away all through the game despite the mounting score against them. At times they hemmed the Legion in with sustained attacks but weathering these storms Legion got a like number with Richard and Perry accounting for the other two.

In the losing Navy cause Hennessey and Jay shot a brace apiece with McDougall, Dumas and Hennessey finding the twines once each.

Displaying a passing attack that Navy could not cope with and at the same time breaking away for rink-length sorties three of which led to goals Legion raced into a 5-0 lead before the game was eight minutes old. At 2:12 Walsh Shepherd passed in front of the Navy net fired in Dowling's pass-out for the opening counter. A minute and four seconds later Drillon alternating between a defence and centre post, took Plum McDonald's forward at the red line to skate in alone for goal number two.

A minute later Legion again smug the red light blink as McDougall sent Drillon away at the line with the latter passing to Strain for a counter from five feet out. Pressing continuously Legion gave Navy no rest and Drillon on play with Strain and McDonald shot goal number four.

Navy fighting back at every opportunity were outlucked on the other side on a smooth passing attack. Legion made it 8-0 as Carver took Shepherd's passout after the latter had checked the puck to drive a waist high drive into the twines.

Finally hitting their real form Navy took the play away from the Legion for the next seven minutes to shoot two goals, McCourt, Strain and Carver. Then Navy shot on another play started by Kelly at 14:25. But again the Legion's passing "juggernaut" got rallying with three goals in two minutes and three seconds. Dowling accounted for the first two, firing home McDonald's rebound and then converting Shepherd's passout. Shepherd got the final goal as he angled in on Dowling's pass across the goalmouth to give the Legion team an 8-2 lead.

Seven straight goals rattled off the Legion sticks in the second period without a return as they built up a 15-2 lead; Drillon had three of them with Carver, Richard, Perry and Strain getting the others on smooth passing attacks. Then Navy broke into the scoring again as Jay and Hennessey banged in counters 44 seconds apart but Legion again had the final say as Dowling took Carver's pass with 52 seconds remaining to make the count read 16-4.

Fighting back in what was by now a hopeless cause Navy held the offensive alive through the final twenty minutes of play. In less than seven minutes of the period they accounted for two goals from the sticks of McDougall and Bradley. Legion retaliated with their couplet as Drillon scored on beautiful solo effort through the entire team and before the goal-tee was over the teams split two; Navy got the first one on a Higgs shot to Hennessey play with Carver winding up the scoring 24 seconds before the end on a pass from Drillon.

Lord Alexander Learns To Curl



His Excellency Viscount Alexander, Governor-General of Canada, learns from Andy Caldwell, rinkman, how to heave the granite at the Royal Montreal Curling Club, on Saturday (Jan. 18th). Canada's demerit Governor-General spent some time discussing the proper method of throwing the stone with Royal Montreal's team leader, he journeyed to the Montreal Rackets Club and then to the United Services Club, on Sherbrooke Street in Montreal.

Charlottetown's Curling Club is one of the busiest spots in town these days as exponents of the "rosarin" game engage in British Consols elimination play and together with other club matches are producing some of the keenest competition in years.

Wednesday night a rink skipped by Frank Acorn and including Andy Likely, Johnnie Squarbriggs and Arnett Howatt earned a spot in the provincial playdowns when they adopted the role of "giant killers" and turned back the strong W. R. Cruikshank rink in an extra-end match.

The Acorn rink did it the hard way also. At one time during the game they trailed 8-3 but rallied to get back on even terms and then pulled through on the extra end for what was considered an upset victory. The match after the first few ends produced some great curling. Both rinks, while missing badly in their lapses with some brilliant shots later on and the match held the interest of spectators right until the final rock had been sent sliding down the ice.

The Cruikshank rink, however, may still be important factors in the provincial struggle. Shoved down to the bottom bracket by their loss they can still get into the finals in their remaining games and it is well within the realm of possibility that they may yet get another crack at the Acorn rink in the final competition which will decide the rink that will represent the Province at the Dominion Tankard scheduled this year for Saint John, New Brunswick.

But still to be considered mightily are the threats likely to be forthcoming from Summerside, Montague and Alberton. For the past number of years a Charlottetown rink has held a monopoly on the honor of representing the Province. This can't go on interminably; the law of averages is bound to even matters up and who knows but this year may prove to be the one that will see Charlottetown's grip on the trophy broken.

Charlottetown's Kinsmen Juveniles Wednesday night chalked up their second victory of the season when they defeated the present juvenile champions 6-2 in Summerside. Despite the score the rink saw a brisking effort to tie the game each period and we would judge that the Charlottetown team, providing they can grab honors in the local league are going to make a mighty effort to re-capture the juvenile title which Summerside won last year.

Tonight at the Forum minor hockey will hold sway once more scheduled and the close struggles the squads have been waging to date ensures the fans of another exciting evening.
