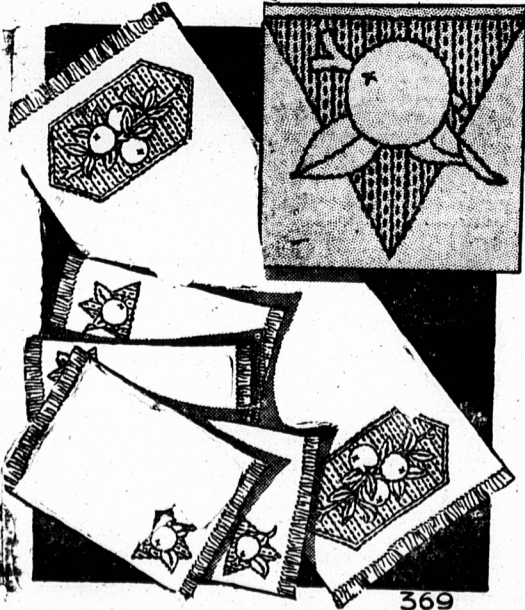

Going Down "Into the Valley of the Shadow" is Hard for Any Mother, Yet Constant Mourning is More Dangerous to Her Future

Dear Miss Dix—I have been married more than eight years to a wonderful man, the kindest person I have ever known.

Answer: You have my sympathy and you will have that of every woman who reads your pathetic letter.

I have known mothers who have lost little toddlers at their most appealing age. I have known mothers who have lost beautiful daughters just beginning to realize their ambition.

When I say this to you, don't think I am lacking in sympathy. I am not. But what you need now is not pity, but a brace.

Try to bring some practical sense to bear upon your problems. Get a book from the library called "If I Had Four Apples" and let it show you how foolish it is for people to enslave themselves to the idea of buying a house when they cannot afford it.

Dear Miss Dix—My husband and I have a very dear friend in another State who wants to take our boy of 14 and educate him and give him a home nearly all the time, and our son is at the age when he needs a man's guidance.

If the wife objects to her husband taking the child, that settles the question, so far as you are concerned. Nothing that the man could possibly give the boy would compensate for the misery he would undergo in a home where he was the source of discord between a husband and wife.

You must remember that a woman can be just as jealous of a child as she could be of any siren. Indeed, I doubt if a childless woman's jealousy of a child would be fiercer and bitterer than it would be of any woman, because in it would be a sense of her own failure in that she had not given her husband the thing he wanted most in the world, and the added torment of knowing that she was not enough for her husband's happiness as he was for his.

No strange woman is fitted to deal with an adolescent. Especially is no woman who regards a boy as her enemy capable of being either just or compassionate to him, and a child needs more than anything that money would buy him are just these things, particularly at his time of life.

Far, far better to keep your boy with you. He is your responsibility and you haven't the right to pass the buck to any one else. Don't regret that you can't give him much money and as many indulgences as this man can. You can give him love and a peaceful home. And that's the best thing that any child can have.
