Death by gas poisoning threatened the 70,000 slumbering inhabitants of Molenbeek, Belgium, for three hours recently, and only the prompt action of police and firemen averted wholesale asphyxiation. At one o'clock in the morning the city's gas pressure dropped so low that lights in the houses and streets went out. Almost as suddenly it returned, and gas hissed from thousands of unlit jets. Every available policeman and fireman was ordered to warn the people and to turn off the street jets. Warning shouts from the streets and pounding of doors to arouse the sleepers caused a spread of terror which subsided as the people realized their danger and turned off the gas. No casualties were reported.
