WINTER MAIL SERVICE

An endeavor will be made during the winter to have the Saturday mail delivered to the Island by airplane. The ferry service is proving inadequate, according to a communication from the Postmaster General to Premier Saunders, dated Oct. 26th. It was pointed out that a daily air mail service between the mainland and Charlottetown could not be guaranteed at the present time.

WELL KNOWN PASTOR

Rev. David Jones, for the last four years pastored the Congregational church at Fort Fairfield, Me., has tendered his resignation and in January will sail for Wellington, New Zealand, where he has accepted a call to the Newtown Congregational church. Mr. Jones is a native of Wales, was educated in England and came to Georgetown, P. E. I., in 1918, going to Tyne Valley, N. B., in 1917, and to Keswick Ridge, N. B., in 1919, and was two years in Mapleton, Me., before coming here. His wife was Gwendoline Watts, of Fredericton, N. B.

COMMISSIONER APPOINTED

At a meeting of the Provincial Government held on Thursday, Mr. Geo. E. Brown, of Margate was appointed a member of the Prohibition Commission in place of the late Mr. John Agnew. It was decided to call for tenders for the revision and consolidation of the statutes. Messrs. Vernon MacLeod, Albany, Andrew Taylor, Rollo Bay, and Thomas Taylor, Annandale, were appointed Justices of the Peace and Commissioners for taking acknowledgments of deeds. Dr. J. A. Macdonald of Halifax appeared before the Government on behalf of the School for the Blind, asking governmental aid for that institution and also for the indigent aged blind in Prince Edward Island. He asked the privilege of having himself or some representative address the Legislature at its next session, when a request will be made to place a sum in the estimates.

Extensions To Plant At Sackville

SACKVILLE, N. B., Oct. 8.—At a recent meeting of the directors of Enamellicating Products Limited, it was decided to make extensions and alterations at both the Sackville and Amherst plants, in order to give better facilities for handling the increasing business of this company.

Work will be started immediately on the construction of a one-story wooden building at the Sackville plant. The structure which will be 50x100 ft., will contain pattern, machine and carpenter shops, as well as a japanning room. An electric spanning oven will be installed, with the most modern equipment. There will also be a first aid room in this building.

At the Amherst plant, facilities for handling the enameling requirements of the company are to be increased. The whole of the stove manufacturing will be done in Sackville, and the building at Amherst, where a few stoves are now manufactured, will be turned into a wet process enameling plant. A large electrically driven compressor will be installed, and arrangements are being made to start another oven to accommodate the increasing business. An up-to-date sprinkler system is also being placed in the plant.

So that all in all, the Enamellicating Products Limited, is in a thriving condition, and the alterations and additions being made at the respective plants will mean additional employees.

JOE VILLA BIKE RIDER IS HURT IN BIG RACE

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—Fourteen teams of cyclists pedaled dizzily around the treacherous saucer of the Broadway Armory today, well on their way toward a new world's record in six-day bicycle racing annuals.

Rene Boogman of the Holland team lay in the hospital in a critical condition and disfigured for life as the result of a handlebar locking accident with Pete Van Kempen. The pair crashed during a jam yesterday and Boogman's throat was cut almost from ear to ear, requiring sixty stitches.

Van Kempen, who with Mike Rodak was leading the field at the 7th hour as slightly injured. Only a slight margin of points separated the leaders from De Baetes and De Clerck, who lost the lead last night in a continuous series of jams.

"Dead Man's Curve" claimed several victims in spills, though none was seriously injured. Boogman's partner, Art Spencer, withdrew from the race after the crash.

IMPRESSIVE ARMISTICE SERVICES AT OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Oct. 30.—Impressive ceremonies conducted by the Canadian Legion will mark the commemoration here of Armistice Day November 11. At 11 o'clock in the morning the booming of a gun will denote the commencement of the two minutes' silence. Services will be conducted on Parliament Hill at 3.30 p. m. and will be attended by many of the leaders in Canada's national life.

A white ensign recently received from Admiralty of the Fleet Earl Jellicoe by the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League will be formerly accepted. A number of poppies made by disabled veterans in England and woven into a wreath will be placed on the Cenotaph. This is in keeping with a wish expressed by Field Marshal Earl Haig before his death.

New York Writer Says Hornsby Will Draw \$40,000 Yearly From Cubs.

Despite the news that Rogers Hornsby, last year manager and star of the Boston Braves in the National League, will remain with Boston next year, Joe Villa, of the New York Sun, one of the best informed baseball men in the United States, avers that the great "Rajah" is signed with the Chicago Cubs and that the deal will be announced officially in a few days.

According to Villa, Hornsby has been signed for the past two weeks or so, but the owners of both teams involved in the deal are waiting for other details of the deal to be definitely settled before the announcement is made.

Villa claims that Hornsby was granted \$20,000 for signing a Chicago Cub contract. It is understood his official yearly salary as a Cub will be forty thousand dollars.
