Cook's Corner

GRAPE SPONGE

1 tablespoon granulated gelatine 1/4 cup cold water 1 cup hot grape juice 1/2 cup lemon juice 3/4 cup sugar 3 egg whites

METHOD: Place the cold water in a bowl and sprinkle the gelatine over this. Allow to stand for five minutes. Then add to the hot grape juice along with the sugar and lemon juice. Stir until the gelatine and sugar are dissolved. Chill the mixture, stirring occasionally, until about the consistency of strained horvay. Then beat with a rotary beater until frothy.

Beat the egg whites until stiff and fold these into the grape mixture. Then beat the whole thing until it is stiff enough to hold its shape. Pile into sherbet glasses and chill. Serve this also with custard sauce, if desired.

JELLIED PEACHES

1 tablespoon granulated gelatine 1/4 cup cold water 1 cup hot water 1/2 cup sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup orange juice 1 tablespoon lemon juice 2 cups sliced canned peaches

METHOD: Sprinkle the gelatine over the cold water and allow to stand for five minutes. Now add to the hot water, along with the sugar and salt. Stir until the gelatine and sugar are dissolved. Then add the orange and lemon juice. Mix well and chill the mixture until it reaches the consistency of strained horvay. Add the well drained sliced canned peaches at this time and then pour the mixture into molds which have been chilled in cold water. Chill until firm, or until ready to serve.
