"WIPING OUT REPUBLICS."

The Chicago Tribune, which in many respects is the foremost journal of the great western metropolis, is seriously disturbed by a recent despatch from Lord Roberts to the War Office in which he speaks of Mr. Steyn as "the late President of the Orange Free State," and also speaks of that State as "a late Republic." The Tribune rightly understands from this what the London Times has explicitly stated, that the Orange Free State has ceased to exist as a political entity. Upon this the worthy Tribune waxes wroth and says that sentiments like these "grate upon American ears," that even a general so illustrious as Lord Roberts has no right to wipe out a free state with the sword and that there is no pretence of justification for denying independence to the Orange Free State.

Whereupon THE GUARDIAN of Prince Edward Island rises to offer a few observations. Our first observation is that if it be wrong to make a conquest of the Orange State by the sword and incorporate the state into the territories of Great Britain it does not lie in the mouth of any supporter of President McKinley, as the Tribune is, to offer objection thereto. Why, the sword of the United States is even now not yet returned to its scabbard after a war of conquest. Pray in what way did Dewey and Sampson and Shafter win their more or less imperishable laurels, save in a war of conquest? And if it be a crime to "wipe out a republic with the sword," we rise to inquire what has become of Cuba Libre and the Filipino Republic and by whose sword did they cease to exist? Why did not these operations and the sentiments which led up to them "grate upon American ears"?

"Only the spirit of military aggression," says the Tribune, "licentious might, unbridled power, covetousness and lust of empire can be put forward as defending these acts of cruel rapacity." Indeed! And again THE GUARDIAN rises to observe that the strong language of the Tribune may have some justification if applied to the conquest and acquisition of Cuba, Porto Rico, Hawaii, Guam and the Philippine Islands. These Islands had not levied war against the United States; they had committed no acts of hostility against the big American Republic; they had not prepared to do so or threatened to do so; they had menaced no interest of the United States. Yet their former political status was "wiped out by the sword," their government was taken away, and the flag of the United States and the government of the United States have been imposed upon them. There are many thinking men about the world who have seen in these transformations some indications of that spirit of military aggression, licentious might, unbridled power, covetousness and lust of empire which the Tribune so keenly scents in far off South Africa.

And why is the the Orange State being wiped off the map and hereafter to be spoken of as the late republic? Surely Lord Roberts is not now at Bloemfontein without some excuse! He is there because the Boer oligarchy wantonly and wickedly and utterly without just cause or provocation levied war against the free and peaceful British provinces of Cape Colony and Natal, invaded their soil, slew their people, ravaged their properties, tore down the British flag and attempted to forcibly annex their country and bring it into subjection. These are the reasons why Lord Roberts is now at Bloemfontein, why he has erected the British flag there, why the late republic shall hereafter be British territory and why the 80,000 Dutchmen within its bounds must, if they remain, become subjects of the Queen. The justice of the case is so plain and clear that he who runs may read it. It is patent to all men. It is quite beyond dispute. There is nothing in what Lord Roberts has done or proposes to do that ought to grate upon the ears of any intelligent lover of right and justice, whether in Chicago, or Washington, or Bloemfontein. Hence it was that the British Commander was welcomed to the Free State capital as a deliverer, with flags and banners, with exultant songs and the strains of God Save the Queen. The new order of things will have the immediate support of a majority of the people white and colored, and even of many of the Dutch speaking burghers, who do not, all told, make up one half the total population of the late Republic.

When the American Republic entered upon the war with Spain, though without a sufficient excuse and certainly with not any such justification as Britain has for now drawing the sword, the people of Canada and Britain gave their sympathy, and Britain with her naval supremacy prevented the armed intervention of the

Continental Powers. This was done because we believed that the discontented Spanish possessions would be ruled more justly, would be more free, more contented and progressive if brought under the American flag. We had no narrow jealousy of American expansion, no fear of the new development of naval power. With a fourth part of the world's population, a fifth part of the earth's area and nearly one half its commerce under the British flag we neither needed nor wished for more. If more territory comes to us now it comes unsought and because the acquisition is forced upon us to secure that which we have held for a century past. Our new possessions will be as free, as justly governed and as progressive as the other possessions of the Empire.

And it is to be observed that there is far greater unanimity throughout the British Empire of four hundred millions of people as to the justice of our present cause than there was in the United States in the war of Secession or in the war with Spain. From every quarter of the Queen's dominions men of many kindreds and tongues have voluntarily offered their service and their lives to support in the present crisis the Old Flag which is to them the symbol of liberty and justice. French and English from Canada and Australia, Red Indians from the Dominion and Indian princes from the East, Maories from New Zealand, Negroes from Jamaica, Kaffirs, Zulus, Basutos and Bechuanas from South Africa, have offered themselves in tens of thousands, and where their services have been declined they have felt it a great disappointment. With such unanimity in the great community of nations with which the genius and justice of of Britain have girdled the earth, we can well afford to disregard the envious and narrow jealousy and spleen with which a section of the United States press and people regard our present action.

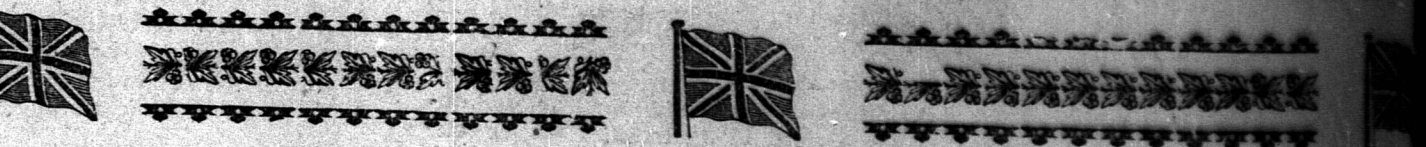
