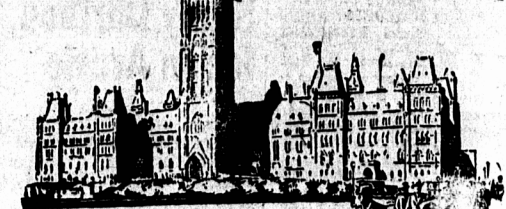

OTTAWA LETTER

Last week I had the pleasure of attending a dinner in the Chateau Laurier, sponsored by John R. MacNicol, member of Parliament from Davenport, Ontario. Mr. MacNicol is an engineer by profession and has always taken an active part in the development of the coal industry in Canada. After dinner, several addresses on Canadian coal production were delivered. These addresses were well prepared and were well received. My reason for mentioning this dinner, however, is to tell you that three Prince Edward Islanders played very important parts in the proceedings.

Even Matthews, who was born in Albany, Prince Edward Island, and was educated there, introduced one of the chief speakers, Mr. Mervyn Brown, formerly of Little York, Prince Edward Island. In his introduction he said: "Some people are born great, some people achieve greatness, and some people are Prince Edward Islanders" and that Mr. Brown fell into all these categories. Mervyn Brown has long been connected with coal and gas interests in Western Canada. His address was logical, close-

ly reasoned and highly interesting. Angus MacInnis, M. P. for one of the Vancouver seats, formerly of Glen William, Prince Edward Island, had the honour of introducing one of the other speakers. The main speaker of the evening, Sir Albert Braithwaite, gave a very interesting address on coal production in England during the war. When he called upon to stimulate coal production, England had less than a fortnight's supply on hand. He introduced and carried out extensive strip mining operations whereby the production of coal was greatly increased. Strip mining is only possible where the coal is near the surface. Sir Albert said that strip mining would be most beneficial in Alberta and that could he get capital released from England he would be most interested in financing strip mining operations in Canada.

It was my rare good fortune to be able to steal away from the House of Commons last week to take in one of the Drama Festival productions at the Little Theatre in Ottawa. The production was "Saint Joan" by George Bernard Shaw and it was put on by the Little Theatre Group for London, Ontario—a group which has long been noted for the excellence of its productions. The Ottawa Little Theatre was packed with a very eager and intense audience. Many in the audience had already taken part in the festival earlier in the week, while others were waiting to compete later on. I think that it is so much easier for the actors when the audience is appreciative and sympathetic.

I had not thought it possible for a group of amateurs to do "Saint Joan" so well. From the very beginning to the end, with two very minor exceptions, the production was excellent. It is a very difficult play to produce and, of course, it would be impossible to produce it without someone adequate to take the part of Joan.

The Auditor, Robert Speaight, brilliant English actor, author and producer, stated that the evening was an experience. He said that he had seen Sybil Thorndyke, celebrated English actress, play the part of Joan several years ago; but that he felt Miss Olga Landiak's interpretation was the most satisfactory. At the end of the week I was pleased to learn that the adjudicator had awarded first place to this play and that Miss Landiak was adjudged the best actress.

I hope that next year Prince Edward Island will have an entry in the finals. The Drama Festival will be held in Toronto next year and every effort should be made to have an Island entry.
