Waldorf Had Game Illegally

New York, March 25.—In the appellate division of the Supreme Court yesterday a judgment convicting the Waldorf Astoria Hotel Company of violating Sec. 13 of the Forest, Fish and Game law, was affirmed. The offense charged was having English pheasants in the company's possession, contrary to law. It was contended that the pheasants were bred and killed in the State of New Jersey, but the law provides that the act shall apply to any animal, bird or fish coming from without the State, just the same as though taken within the State. In the trial before Justice Greenbaum the Company was fined \$4,470.

Mail Steamers in Collision

Sailors Toll to the Atlantic

One Hundred and Ninety-Nine Lives and 54 Ships Lost

Boston, March 25.—A total of 199 lives and 54 ships have been sacrificed to the storms and treacherous coasts of New England and the Mar time Provinces for the winter just ended, according to the statistics compiled by the Associated Press to-day. Of the vessels, no account has been taken of the dozens that have been driven ashore and later refloated, and figures do not include the loss in Connecticut waters. The long list of dead swollen out of all proportion to those of many previous years by the sinking of the steamer Larchmont in Block Island Sound the night of February 11, with an estimated loss of 130 lives. This was one of the great disasters of the year in these waters.

Austrian Company to Pay Fire Loss

VIENNA, March 25.—It is understood that the claimants will accept the compromise agreement recently signed in Vienna between the Austrian Phoenix Insurance Company and the American committee representing policy holders in San Francisco regarding losses suffered during the fire which followed the earthquake in April last.

Blind Trooper Secures Relic

BROCKVILLE, March 25.—Lorne Malloy, the blind trooper of the South African corps, has just added another relic to his collection. It is a small fragment of bullet, of irregular flat shape, about three-sixteenths of an inch across, with sharp jagged edges, which was removed from his forehead a few days ago.

Juries Haunted by an Unknown Man

In Toronto and Drove Him to Suicide Craving Forgiveness For His Act

Toronto, March 25.—"Haunted by furies, I am chasing myself from place to place and can find no rest anywhere," was the sentence found written in the notebook of an unknown man who committed suicide in a York Street lodging house early Saturday evening by labelling gas through a tube attached to a gas jet.

Thought End of World Had Come

Quebec, March 25.—A fever of excitement prevailed at the little town of Scott, on the line of Quebec Central Railway which is described as a little sort of a panic, when the thunder and lightning which prevailed during Sunday last upon their knees in prayer, thinking that the end of the world had arrived.

Will Avoid All Friction

O'Brien to Withdraw From Irish Leaders

LONDON, March 25.—William O'Brien, Nationalist member of the House of Commons for Cork, has announced his intention of withdrawing himself from the present session of parliament in order to stop further friction with the Irish Party which has now virtually accepted the Government's proposal for Irish legislation. Thus there is no longer any serious divergence, Mr. O'Brien explains, between himself and the party. It is further stated that Mr. O'Brien and his friends have decided to drop all pending litigation with the followers of John E. Redmond.

Big Robbery of U.S. Mail

New York, March 25.—One hundred and twenty-five pieces of registered mail were stolen from the pouch which left this city on Jan. 17, on the steamer La Savoie, according to Post Master Wilcox. On Jan. 11, a registered pouch, containing one hundred and twenty-eight packages left here, with 3,200 bags of general mail. When this mail reached France the postal authorities there discovered 135 of the 128 packages had been abstracted. We hold the French Government receipt for 3,200 packages all right and are satisfied that the robbery took place in France. The fact that a cablegram states that some one attempted to negotiate American securities in Paris, strengthens us in that belief.

Eremon Won Grand National

LIVERPOOL, March 25.—The Grand National Steeple Chase of ten thousand sovereigns for five year olds and upwards, about four and a half miles was run at Liverpool after a meeting today and won by Stanley Howard Eremon. Thomas was second and Poindexter third. Thirty-three horses failed.
