MANY WRECKS NOW REPORTED

In Montreal From Recent Gale, Including Three Schooners, - Capt Couillard Drowned At River Blanche and Crew of Four at Isle Verte On First Voyage

MONTREAL, Nov. 19. (Special)-Reports of disasters caused to shipping by the recent gales in the Gulf continue to arrive. The schooner Marie Louise, Capt Gourdau which left here last Tuesday for River Blanche was wrecked on Trois Piatoles reef on Friday night. Crew saved.

The tug Spray, valued at \$20,000 as a steel wreck on Madore Island. Capt. Couillard lost his life in the wreck of his schooner at River Blanche. The schooner Canada of Matane was wrecked on Isle Verte and the crew of four men drowned on her first voyage.

THE HAMILTON STREET RAILWAY

Strike Settling Down For Long Struggle - Public Sympathy With The Strikers

TORONTO, Nov. 18. (Special)-The Hamilton Street Railway strike has settled down to a long and bitter struggle. Official efforts at mediation have been abandoned as hopeless, though the Mayor is still working for settlement. The public sympathy is with the strikers. The Company operated cars on Saturday, but they were boycotted. There is no disturbance but the people, even those going a long distance to a football match, refused to ride.

TERRORISTS IN RUSSIAN POLAND

Seize a Million Roubles and Are Compelled to Abandon It.

WARSAW, Poland, Nov. 19. (Special)-A daring Terrorist attack was made in the streets today on a collection of the Government alcohol stores who were escorted by two soldiers. The Terrorists killed one soldier, wounded the collector and seized a bag containing a million dollars. The remaining soldier fired quickly, killed a passer by and wounded another whereupon the Terrorists dropped their booty and escaped.

CONVICT SAYS HE PERJURED

Himself in Convicting His Pal, Being Promised His Own Freedom.

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, Nov. 19. (Special)-Hale, one of the Birnie gang recently sent down for three years for arson, has made a statement declaring he committed perjury in testifying against his pal S. Buchanan, who received a seven year sentence for the same crime. Hale says he gave false evidence at the suggestion of a crown detective who promised him his freedom and a job as liquor detective provided Buchanan was convicted.

THREE BURNED IN REGINA HOTEL

Two More Dangerously Injured, One Being Mr McInnis Of Regina Standard, Formerly Of Charlottetown - Other Guests Numbering Sixty Got Out Safely - Loss \$80,000

REGINA, Nov. 19. (Special)-The Windsor Hotel here was burned this morning. There were 65 guests in the hotel and three of them were burned to death. The dead are M. Musseter, Manager of the Regina Planning Mills; L. Musseter, Assistant Manager and Robert Johnson, well-borer. The injured are: Henry Jones probably fatally; J. W. McInnis of Regina Standard, (formerly of Charlottetown) dangerously cut.

The hotel register was lost and there may be more fatalities. The fire started in a bedroom on the second floor and caused a loss of eight thousand dollars. The insurance is \$35,000. Robert Johnson got out safely but went back to help a woman whose cry he thought he heard. Walker and Jones jumped from a third story window.

ANOTHER RUSSIAN FALLS VICTIM

POTAWA, Russia, November 18. (Special)-General Palkawinkoff, commander of the garrison here was shot dead to-night by an unknown assassin, who also killed a soldier passing at the time.

JOSIAH GILBERT IN WITNESS BOX

Aged Prisoner Declares Henderson's Death Due to Accident - Story Shaken By Crown Prosecutor

REGINA, Sask., Nov. 17. - Josiah Gilbert, the man who is charged with the murder of Barrett Henderson of North River P.E.I., occupied the stand for the greater part of yesterday afternoon, and will appear in the court again today. He is making out just the best case for himself and the general opinion is that Gilbert would have been better out of the box. "He is hanging himself," remarked a lawyer at the close of the sitting. With his seventy years bearing heavily on his shoulders the aged prisoner appeared in the dock to open the case for the defence. He walked with slowly faltering steps to the witness-box and when he spoke his words were hardly audible to his lawyer. The prisoner told a straight story of the accidental shooting, although he omitted to mention how the gun came to be loaded with slugs instead of shot. He told how he was walking out of the stable door when he fell and the gun went off and shot Henderson. The latter, mis-

struing the motive of Gilbert, started to run and witness picked up the gun, which had been knocked out of his hand by the impact of the sudden discharge and chased after his man. He was dazed through the fall when he stumbled, and it was not until he saw the two men passing along the roadway, that he realized that he still held the gun as he ran. He then "came to," and dropped the gun. The weapon has not yet been found and Gilbert denied any knowledge of where it is. Mr. Allan undertook the cross-examination for the Crown and succeeded in making Gilbert contradict himself on many different points. For instance, one story he secured from the prisoner was that he picked Henderson up after the shooting and returned for the gun, while at another point of the evidence he stuck to the old story that Henderson got up himself and started to run.

HE FELL FORTY FEET TO DEATH

Matthew Cashen of Halifax Fell from Signal Staff and Was Killed

HALIFAX, Nov. 19. (Special)-Matthew J. Cashen, aged 38, a plumber, while repairing the lightning conductor on the main signal staff at the Citadel this afternoon fell a distance of forty feet and received injuries which resulted in his death three hours later. Both of his legs were badly shattered and he was injured internally. The accident was caused by the breaking of a rope holding the boatswain's chair. He leaves a widow.

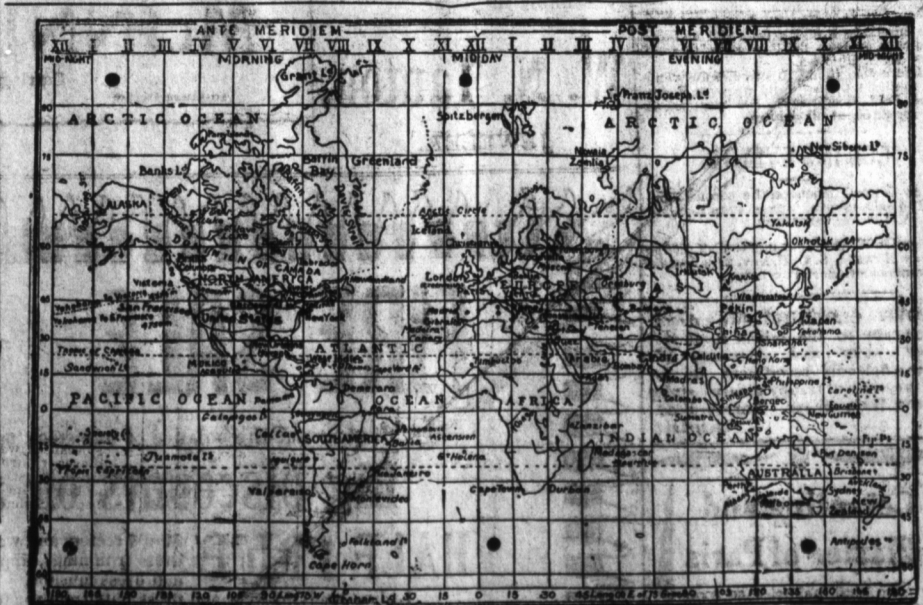

THE EXPLOSION IN ST. PETERS

ROME, Nov. 18. - Today's bomb explosion made the third anarchist outrage in Italy in four days, the others having been the murder of Professor Rossi in Naples yesterday, and the explosion of a bomb in front of the cafe Aragno, in this city on Nov. 14. The attempt of today has caused deep-seated and universal horror and indignation, particularly because of the locality selected by the miscreants, and the resentment of the people is great. St. Peter's is the greatest basilica in Christendom. Three hundred and fifty years were occupied in constructing the edifice, which stands today a result of the efforts of forty-three popes, and the genius of Michael Angelo, Bramante and Raphael. The theory is held that this attempt was not directed against the papacy, but rather a challenge to society in general by attacking religion, the most sacred institution of the people.

JAPAN SQUADRON TO VISIT 'FRISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17. - Collector of the port Stratton has been notified to prepare for the reception of a Japanese squadron which will come to this port next spring. The visit will assume much international importance and every courtesy is to be offered the officers and squadron. The Tokio government has appropriated 500,000 yen for the expenses of the cruise. Vice Admiral Shichiro Kataoka, commander of the third squadron off Port Arthur, under Admiral Togo, will be in command. The squadron will be composed of three vessels, a first-class battleship and two cruisers. It will come direct to San Francisco, arriving in either March or April after making a brief stop at Honolulu.

FOUNDER OF KING'S DAUGHTERS DEAD

NEW YORK, Nov. 17. - Miss Margaret McDonald Bottom, wife of the late Rev. Francis Bottom, whose remarkable success as an evangelist among the foremost women of society in this city during the last generation won her fame, died Wednesday morning from a complication of diseases at her home in East Seventeenth street. She was in her seventy-ninth year and leaves three sons, one clergyman in London, another a clergyman of Grace church, this city, and the third a lawyer also in New York. She was founder of the woman's religious organization of King's Daughters, which was formed on Jan. 13 1880, was its president from the day of its inception to that of her death, and an active worker in the field covered by a circle of 17.
