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Right Hon. A. J. Balfour Addresses the Conference

Approves of Position Taken by United States and Suggests Further Limitation of Submarines, Discusses Great Britain's Isolation and Dependence Upon Ocean Traffic for Existence.

(Special to The Guardian.)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Great Britain stands beside the United States as a firm friend in this conference. The speech today of Arthur James Balfour is but the index of British policy, which now aims to make the conference a success by assisting the American position in every way possible. Baron Kato for Japan; Premier Briand for France and Senator S. C. Hanes for Italy, followed Mr. Balfour, accepting the plan in principle of making only reservations for modifications of detail.

Not a syllable of equivocation, not a phrase of lukewarm comment, but a wholehearted approval came from the head of the British delegation. And as if to reinforce this sentiment with something even more authoritative, Mr. Balfour read with dramatic effect a cablegram from Prime Minister Lloyd George, whose absence from the conference is the single regrettable incident thus far.

The Government have followed the proceedings at the opening session of the conference with profound appreciation and wholehearted endorsement your opinion that the speeches made by President Harding and Secretary of State Hughes were bold and statesmanlike utterances pregnant with infinite possibilities, read the cable. "Nothing could augur better for the ultimate success of the conference. Please convey to both our most sincere congratulations."

Mr. Balfour suggested only two reservations on submarines and on large tonnage of submarines. He has been allowed to exceed the amount allowed in the excess of the tonnage now possessed by any nation.

He suggested the conference ought to consider the advisability of preventing construction of these large submarines not intended for defence, whose whole purpose is attack and which only serve to add to war's sorrow. As to replacement, which involve the extent to which Great Britain is willing to accept a ten years naval holiday, Mr. Balfour proposed no details, merely suggesting that Great Britain was willing to leave both the reservations to consideration of the conference committee.

They are in Canada for a few months hunting and fishing in the west and will be in Ottawa several days.

N. S. Boy Killed While Hunting

SPRINGHILL MENES, N. S., Nov. 14.—John Penny the fifteen-year-old son of Oliver Penny, was accidentally killed by a bullet from a 22-calibre rifle while hunting rabbits today. Penny was using his rifle to brush the snow from the bush when it was discharged, the bullet scaring his face and entering his eye. His boy companion, Malcolm Cummings, ran for help, and his mother arrived at the scene of the tragedy in time to witness the death of her son.

Organized Plot In Great Britain

LONDON, Nov. 14.—Definite evidence has been recently forthcoming that there is an organized public meeting in this country. Efforts on the part of the British Empire Union to avoid the presence of undesirables by admitting only ticket-holders have been frustrated by ticket forgeries, and at a recent British Empire Union meeting, where disorderly scenes occurred, 150 forged tickets were taken at the door.

British Restoring Order in Malabar

LONDON, Nov. 11.—The Indian Police has issued a communique to the effect that steady progress is being made towards the restoration of order in the disturbed area of Malabar. British-Indian forces have undertaken numerous raids, dispersing bands of rebels and capturing their supplies. Sixty-one rebels have been killed and a large number wounded in skirmishes but only one policeman has been killed and four wounded.

Curtis Steeves Held At Woodstock On Serious Charge

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Nov. 15.—Charged with assaulting the eight-year-old daughter of Edison Steeves, a farmer living four miles from Centreville, Curtis Steeves, a son of Galus Steeves, of Albert County, N. B., who was recently acquitted of a charge of murdering his wife and six children, was arrested by Sheriff Foster and Deputy Sheriff Moores, of Carleton County, and brought here yesterday. The child is reported to be in a serious condition, and young Steeves will be remanded pending the outcome of her injuries. Steeves had been doing odd jobs around Centreville since last fall.

Government of Ireland Financial Provisions

LONDON, Nov. 12.—The official Gazette announces that Nov. 22 has been fixed as the appointed day to apply the financial provisions of the Government of Ireland Act in connection with the administration of justice and taxation the other services of local administration will be put into operation in successive months until all of them are completed February 1. The foregoing is in performance of the Premier's promise to Parliament, October 21.

Germany Again Refuses To Meet Instalment

Probably Because of Reported Intention of Allies
to Limit German Chemical Production to
Domestic Demand.

Railway Commissioners Fix Exchange Rate

OTTAWA, Nov. 15.—The Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners in accordance with its judgment and order dated January 14, 1921, has fixed the rate of exchange in connection with shipments of freight between points in Canada and points in U.S. from November 15th to November 30th, inclusive, at 93 per cent and the surcharge on the said traffic at six per cent. The rate of surcharge on international passenger business will be based on ten per cent exchange.

Possible Danger to St. Lawrence Cemeteries

OTTAWA, Nov. 15.—A number of cemeteries along the St. Lawrence River will be submerged if plans "A" and "C", approved by the Hydro-Electric Commission Engineers before the International Joint Waterways Commission, are put in effect. Buried in these cemeteries are Sir James Whitney and a number of United Empire Loyalists and provision for the removal of their bodies would have to be made.

Hunter River Gives Good Hearing

Messrs. Donald McKinnon and J. H. Myers Enthusiastically Applauded as They Score Off Their Opponents.

At the political meeting at Hunter River Monday night the Orange Hall there was filled to capacity. The order maintained was excellent though some of the speakers did not get off without some good natured heckling—particularly Mr. Brown, whose labor gospel did not appear to be taken seriously. The rousing applause given to the Conservative candidate, Messrs. Donald McKinnon and John H. Myers, both before and after their addresses, left little doubt in the mind of any impartial spectator as to the political sentiment of the majority of the audience. Mr. McKinnon presided at the meeting very capably.

Campaign Literature

He was aware that the man at the head of it was getting \$10,000 a year from the Grain Growers of parliament.
