Appointed Director of Public Relations For Conservatives

OTTAWA, Jan. 8 — Hon. John Bracken, leader of the Progressive Conservative Party, today announced the appointment of C. V. Charters of Brampton as director of public relations for the Progressive Conservative Party. Mr. Charters will assume his duties at Ottawa at once.

Mr. Geoffrey Howelcke, who has been editor of the party newspaper Public Opinion for the past few months, will be associated with Mr. Charters in public relations work and will remain as editor of Public Opinion.

Clarence V. Charters was formerly managing director of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association. He was born in Brampton, Ont., in January 1892, the son of the late Sam Charters, publisher of the Brampton Conservative. He was educated in Brampton public and high schools and at the age of 14 went to work as a "printer's devil" in his father's plant. He became secretary and manager of the Charters Publishing Co. Ltd. when it was incorporated in 1919 and president when his father died three years ago.

His father represented Peel in the Ontario Legislature from 1908 to 1913, when he retired. In 1917 he was chosen as Union Government candidate and represented his constituency in the House of Commons from that year until 1925 when he retired. He was Conservative Whip under Hon. Arthur Meighen and later under Hon. R. B. Bennett.

To his new post Mr. Charters will bring not only a sound newspaper and organizing background, but a keen interest in and knowledge of politics.



FRANCO OPPOSED BY CORTES VOTES

Sudden opposition to Generalissimo Francisco Franco developed when the Spanish Cortes met in Madrid and three government bills were opposed by substantial votes although they finally passed. The Cortes, headed by Franco, usually votes without opposition. Observers believe the opposition votes indicate a growing independence among Spanish legislators, bulwarked by international criticism of the Franco regime.

APPOINTMENT OF THREE PROMINENT CANADIANS ANNOUNCED

Prominent figures in the field of industry, commerce and the law were appointed to the Board of The Royal Bank of Canada today. They are, Henry H. Heweston of Toronto, President of Imperial Oil Limited; Raymond Dupuis, K. C. well-known Montreal merchant and President of Dupuis Freres Limitee; and Horatio Ray Milner, K. C. well-known Edmonton Lawyer and President of the Canadian Western Natural Gas, Light, Heat and Power Co. Limited, and other western utilities.

Mr. Heweston has been in the oil business since his discharge from The Royal Air Force in 1919, when he joined Imperial Oil Limited. After a brief practical training course with other student veterans he was assigned to the personnel study of the operations of research branches of the petroleum industry in the United States and served his company in England and on the continent. In 1924 he was sent to Paris to direct work in connection with the construction of refineries for the International Petroleum Company. On his return he specialized in marketing and in 1938 was appointed head of direct marketing for Imperial Oil Limited. In 1940 he was appointed Vice-President and Director of the company and was elected President in 1945.

Mr. Dupuis is a member of the third generation of the Dupuis family who founded the department store and mail order business known as Dupuis Freres Limitee in Montreal in 1868. A lawyer by profession he was called to the Bar of the Province of Quebec in 1930 and was created K. C. in 1945. He has been a Director of Dupuis Freres since 1933 and succeeded his father, the late Albert Dupuis, as president of the firm in 1945. Mr. Dupuis' interests in public affairs are wide. He is President of L'Est Central Commercial Inc., Treasurer of La Chambre de Commerce du district de Montreal, Honorary President of the Chambre de Commerce des Jeunes du district de Montreal, Member of the Administrative Commission of l'Universite de Montreal, President, Federation des Scouts Catholiques de la Province de Quebec, Governor of Notre Dame Hospital and St. Justine Hospital and a member of the provincial committee of the Canadian Youth Commission.

Mr. Milner is senior partner in the legal firm of Milner, Steer, Dyer, Poirer, Martland and Bowker of Edmonton, Alta., where he has practised law since 1912. He was created K. C. in 1921. Mr. Milner is President of the Canadian Western Natural Gas, Light, Heat and Power Co. Limited, Northwestern Utilities Limited, Canadian Utilities Limited, Anglo-Canadian Oil Co. Limited, and Cadomin Coal Co. Limited, and a Director of Burns and Company Limited, Calgary and Edmonton Corporation, Home Oil Corporation, Traders, Finance Corporation and North American Life Insurance Company. He is a Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel, the veteran of the first world war and Edmonton Fusiliers, M. G.

Large Increase in Liquor Consumption

OTTAWA, Jan. 8 — (CP) — Bow-bending by Canadians reached a new peak of vigor in the year ended last March 31, it was disclosed today.

All-time record quantities of spirits and beer went down the hatch in that period, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics announced, though Canadians hoisted somewhat less wine than in the peak year of 1940-41.

Roughly speaking, every man, woman and child — in other words that mythical "average Canadian" — tossed off half a proof gallon of spirits, 12 gallons of beer and nearly a half-gallon of wine during the year. In doing so, he paid out in excise tax, import duties, licence fees and other government charges about \$12.

The "apparent consumption" of spirits in the 12 months — the latest for which figures have been compiled — was 5,864,000 proof gallons, compared with 4,728,000 for the previous peak year ended March 31, 1943.

Beer continued to flow down Canadian throats at an increasing gallop, hitting 130,086,000 gallons for the period reviewed — up about 20,000,000 from the previous year's record mark.

Wine consumption was 4,576,000 gallons, which was up from the preceding 12 months total of 3,712,000 but down from the 4,812,000 of the top year ended March 31.

Excise taxes and import duties, validation fees and licences on spirits collected by the Dominion Government during the fiscal year ended March, 1946, aggregated \$70,399,181 compared with \$44,607,200 in the preceding year.

Excise and import duty revenues and licence fees on malt and malt products rose from \$42,507,254 in 1945 to \$48,228,671. On wines, excise taxes and import duties moved up from \$2,012,112 to \$2,607,232.

GETS WAR MEDAL 30 YEARS LATER

MONTREAL, Jan. 7 — (CP) — A chance meeting at the cenotaph here last Remembrance Day has culminated in the presentation of the Belgian Croix de Guerre 30 years after the decoration was earned.

Pvt. D.M. Morrison of Montreal's Victoria Rifles Regiment won the decoration for displaying great personal courage in the heavy fighting during the last days of the First World War. The scene was Cherisy, in August, 1918, and the great Allied advance was pushing ahead.

Morrison was wounded in the action and did not rejoin his unit at the front. In the meantime, approval for the award had come through.

The medal was placed in a tin box by the acting adjutant, Lieut. W. McMurray, and it was not until he died in 1939 that the decoration came to light in a search of Lieut. McMurray's belongings.

Maj. J.N. Bales, wounded in the same battle as Morrison, took charge of the medal, and searched through the old battalion records, but failed to find a trace of Morrison's whereabouts.

Last Nov. 11, as Maj. Bales was lined up at the Cenotaph with other First World War veterans of the Victoria Rifles, a man approached him.

"Do you remember me, Major?" he asked.

"No I'm blessed if I do," Maj. Bales replied.

"I'm Morrison. If you can recall me," the veteran said.

Morrison was presented with the decoration at the next meeting of the Victoria Rifles Veterans' organization.

SAYS DISABLED HELPED WIN WAR

LONDON, Jan. 7 — (CP) — Of 5,190 British juveniles registered under the Disabled Persons Act, only 61 were war casualties, said Labor Minister Isaacs.

Those disabled from birth or early childhood number 3,160, while 1,690 were disabled in non-industrial accidents. The rest were maimed in industrial accidents.

"With proper care and attention even badly disabled persons helped vitally in winning the war. If they were good enough for that they were good enough to help us win the peace," he said.
