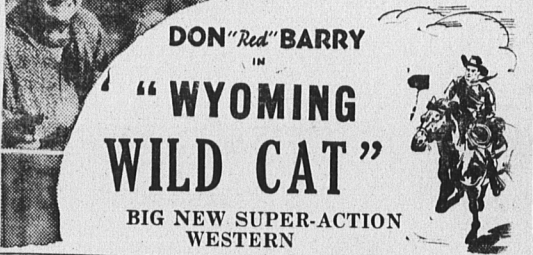

(Associated Press Correspondent, Roy P. Porter, who covered the Blitzkrieg in France and then worked for six months under the German military rule of the occupied zone, relates details of the French army's internal collapse.

PORTER Assisted by Staff Writer NEW YORK, Jan. 16 (AP) - French military men declare that German agents, sometimes working behind the French lines in French uniforms during actual fighting, played a tremendous role in the military campaign which resulted in the occupation of two thirds of France.

The French called this secret work espionage and sabotage. The Germans regarded it as the same systematic campaign of exterior and interior forces working together which brought Nazi occupation of other lands.

It was harder to recognize in France because the counter-espionage service shut off all information about the separation of war and zealous censors clamped down. Beginning long before war actually threatened, French authorities were invading Germany and carrying out not only in Paris, but throughout France - a carefully-planned campaign which came to a head when invading German armies swept through the shattered remnants of French defence units.

Many French officers say they are sure there was a gigantic spy ring operating inside the French army.

One young French official whom I know, commanding a tank unit in France, was managing his equipment from position to position in early June, fighting in a determined effort to halt the advance of German divisions.

In the midst of the battle, a French army motorcycle with sidecar, raced up to him. A man in French captain's uniform excitedly told him he had new orders from the field headquarters, and handed him what appeared to be an official document to withdraw. It was signed and stamped, and when I saw it later, it looked exactly as an army order should.

Such an individual may be actively dangerous, since he has no balanced judgment and none of the wisdom that comes from thought and experience, and his vote is usually given to the popular agitator or propagandist who happens to be fashionable, he said.

Legislators and statesmen of a democracy should be selected because they were leaders of democracy to survive our legislators and statesmen must not be merely followers, so the first and inescapable duty of each citizen in a democracy is to educate himself.

Another duty of equal importance was to regard leaders of a democratic people as demagogues preaching the unbridled passions of the masses.

We do not want a fuhrer or duce who will do our thinking for us, but a man of wisdom and vision who, like the shepherds of Palestine, will lead us to the promised land that all of us are seeking.

The real challenge confronting democracy, said Dr. James, "is that we have lost our sense of direction and are drifting apart, and are hanging separately." Motorboat crew Catches fugitive Fascist General

By ERIC BIGIO Associated Press Staff Writer CAIRO, Egypt, Jan. 14 (AP) - The crew of a British motorboat, directed by patrolling aircraft, has snatched the Italian Blackshirt, Gen. Francesco Argentino, from a hiding place in the swamps of Libya.

The number of Italian generals seized in the fighting in Egypt and the British counter offensive in Libya was increased to 11. A twelfth, Gen. Arnaldo Tassi, was captured in the desert and along the Mediterranean coast.

The British command as commander of Italian forces at Sidi Barrani, Egypt, the first major Fascist base to fall in the desert campaign. He commanded a Blackshirt (political militia) division, having gone into that service from the regular army.

Search for a large party of Italian generals and senior officers, which already has proved successful, still is being carried out by British troops in the R. A. F. area.

"These Italians are the vanguard of the enemy troops who escaped from Bardia (Libya) and which fell Jan. 5) and were making for Tobruk along coastal paths before Bardia was surrounded and finally taken.

A Hurricane pilot sighted a "small party of Italian officers hiding by the water's edge" two days ago, the statement said. He advised a naval unit, which captured the party, including Argentino.

A single British pilot spotted 150 Italian soldiers near the coast, fired warning bursts and "ushered" the captives to a British military unit "much in the manner of a cow pony rounding up steers."

Gen. Bergonzoli deserted his troops before the fall of Bardia, along with two Blackshirt divisional commanders. It was announced at the time. One of them, Gen. Antonelli, has since been captured. Argentino presumably is the other.

British ground forces still are massing about Tobruk preparing slowly for an assault on the town. When this will come remains a matter of conjecture.

Among announced results: - Nine airplanes believed to have been destroyed on the coast, fired from the ground at Catania, Sicily, an oil dump fired and two hangars hit, along with a nearby railway line.

Benina, Italian air base for Benghazi, Libya, hit large fires started by six Italian planes being blazing on the ground, and "many others" believed put out of action.
