Mr. Paige seemed to be in good cheer after spending three months at Mrs. Paige's old homestead. Geo. F. Docherty and Geo. E. Goff accompanied them to Royalty.

LAST evening about eight o'clock the front wheels of the tender attached to one of the engines used in connection with the construction of the approach at the Hillsboro Bridge ran off the track at the same place where the accident took place on the previous evening, just outside the Railway station. The tender was replaced on the track without great difficulty. The accident is said to have been caused by the wheels mounting on the switch guard.

MICHAEL LONERGAN has arrived from Liverpool via the Bavarian to spend some time with his brother James Lonergan the popular lunch man of Queen's Street. Mr. Lonergan is a veteran of the Irish War and has been through the Boer War besides serving seven years in the British Army in the signal corps of General Buller before La Smith and passed through the battles of Colenso, Tugela, Heigh's etc. Mr. Lonergan has the King's medal for service in South Africa and the Queen's medal with six bars.

A MEETING of the Congregation of St. Peter's Cathedral was held Tuesday night to discuss important matters in connection with the departure of Rev. Dr. Hunt. A committee consisting of the Trustees and Churchwardens was appointed to consider the question of a successor to Dr. Hunt in the church and St. Peter's School. A purse of money was presented to Dr. Hunt and an address read speaking in warmest terms of the attachment of the Congregation and its regret at his departure. The recipient replied feelingly and took leave of the members of the congregation present individually.

The attention of the managers of the different fire insurance companies transacting business in Charlottetown has been drawn to the great quality of kerosene oil that is stored in the city and the agents here have been instructed to use all efforts to have the danger removed or failing to do so an increase will be made in the present insurance rates. In no other city or town is oil allowed to be stored in such quantities and although stored here it is a direct violation of Act 43, Vict. Chap. 21, intitled "The Petroleum in Pention Act 1880" and Act 44, Victoria, Chap. 23, intitled "An act to amend the Petroleum Inspection Act 1880." The matter was before the Board of Fire Underwriters at their meeting on Tuesday afternoon and they adjourned for a week in order to bring the matter to the notice of the stores of the oil before taking any action.

The P. E. I. contingent of harvesters are greatly dissatisfied with the way they have been treated since they left home. As they express it they were dumped on the wharf at Pt. du Chene in the early morning in a crizzling rain to shift for themselves. There was not a building open for their shelter; not even the women in the party were looked after. They say they could not even get a drink of water. Some of the party had lunches which were generally distributed. It was not till late in the afternoon when the party reached Sussex that they could get anything. At St. John the railway people gave them a meal and best of all they were able to get water to drink. Reaching there in the early hours of the morning they were forced to sleep in the station floor that was strewn with tobacco juice, cigar stamps and rubbish of all kinds.
