**SOME PRE-ELECTION STATEMENTS.**

There has been a good deal of strong and sometimes reckless statement in the party press of both sides of late, increasing in intensity as polling day approached, but we know of no bolder and, if untrue, no more audacious statement than those which appeared on the first page of the St. John Telegraph of the 2nd instant covering half the page in bold type. These statements were doubtless made for effect in the elections or as interesting news features and they bring in the names of two very prominent and reputable public men of the Maritime Provinces, Sir Louis Davies and Hon. W. S. Fielding. The statements made by The Telegraph are as follows.

"Fielding's price for the country. The reason why Fielding did not stand by Blair and resign from the Cabinet at the same time, was that Sir Wilfrid Laurier promised him the Premiership after the election.

"Sir Louis Davies stated to Mr Blair at that time that he (Davies) had told Sir Wilfrid Laurier if he were a Cabinet Minister he would have gone out with Blair, and stood shoulder to shoulder with him in the fight against the Grand Trunk Pacific Bill."

The Guardian regards both these statements as remarkable. They are certainly of a character that ought not to have been made except on the most undoubted authority. In regard to Mr. Fielding the statement seems calculated to lead to the inference that his convictions were opposed to the G. T. P. agreement, but that by the promise of the succession to the Premiership he gave the measure his support.

The second statement, referring to an alleged conversation between Sir Louis Davies and Mr. Blair, is one in regard to which only one of those two gentlemen, or some bystander, could have knowledge at first hand. The Telegraph appears to have had such close relations with Mr Blair for some time past as to raise a surmise that he may have repeated the conversation, or possibly in some way authorised the reference made in the St. John newspaper. This is pure surmise, however. No authority is given by The Telegraph for the statements it has put forth in regard to either Sir Louis Davies or Hon. Mr. Fielding.

We feel quite sure that Sir Louis Davies holding as he does the position of Judge in the Supreme Court of Canada, and whether he did or did not make any statement to Mr. Blair such as is attributed to him, could not possibly have made it public at such a time as on the eve of an exciting election. On the contrary we believe it would be repugnant to his inclinations to have his name mixed up with the matter in any way.

The elections are now over and any effect upon the voting which The Telegraph's statements could have is a thing of the past. It remains to be seen whether either Sir Louis Davies or Mr. Fielding will think it worth while to deal with the reports in question by way of contradiction or otherwise. If passed by in silence they may confirm or create the impression that three gentlemen who were a short time ago the most prominent Liberals in the three Maritime Provinces were in their convictions opposed to the Grand Trunk Pacific agreement.

**CHINA AND RUSSIA.**

Some days ago we referred to the letters of Li Huang Chang written shortly before his death and advising what course China should pursue in the event of war between Russia and Japan. He advised a strict neutrality until it should be determined which would be likely to prove victor in the strife. Whether as the result of the great statesman's counsel, or not, China has so far in rather timid fashion followed the policy he outlined. She proclaimed her neutrality when the war broke out. She has not materially aided either of the combatants except in a clandestine manner, or under stress of circumstances. She was not able to prevent defeated Russian warships from seeking refuge in her ports, but she insisted, though in a dilatory fashion, on their being dismantled.

But while thus outwardly pursuing a neutral course, China has permitted her people to do a large and lucrative trade in contraband goods, and notably in running the blockade at Port Arthur. In this way the Russian garrison was supplied with food, which but for this source might before the present time have been exhausted. The Japanese Government has remonstrated and it now appears not without effect, however late. The Chinese Government has formally declared itself against any infringement of neutrality further in the way of furnishing supplies to either of the belligerents during the war. This is a blow to Russia, for she has now no open ports in the East. Japan has all her ports open and free from present danger. Moreover as the scale of victory has turned so far in favor of Japan it seems likely that in the future a more strict neutrality will be observed by China against Russia than against Japan.

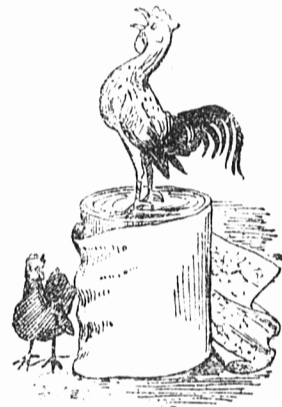
