JAPAN MAKES STEADY PROGRESS IN TRADE RELATIONS.

"Of all the wonders of the world the progress of Japan, in which you have been aiding, seems to me about the most wonderful," wrote Charles Darwin to Prof. E. S. Morse of Salem in 1879. Of the many remarkable aspects of the wonderful record of Japan none is more striking than the altered status of the merchant and trades in the realm, and the share that Japan is now getting of the world's trade and her farseeing preparation for economic competition with Europe and America in the commerce, not only of Asia, but of the Americas and Europe.

With the arrival today in this city of the party of distinguished representatives of Japan's trading, manufacturing and journalistic circles says the Boston Herald, Boston has an opportunity to extend to them that courtesy and distinguished consideration which she previously has shown to equally eminent Japanese diplomats, educators and representatives of the military and governing classes, who have found their way higher days gone by.

Here, as nowhere else to a similar degree in any of the larger centres of population of this country, there has been adequate appreciation of the contribution which Japan has made to the aesthetic enrichment of the higher life of mankind, and here some of the present leaders of the nation over which the Mikado reigns have gained that insight into Occidental civilization which has contributed to enlarge the vision of a people

avid for the last fruits of science, efficient government and study of comparative ethics and religion. Here, too, have centred the operations of some of the most intelligent and liberal of the Christian churches, whose agents have carried to Japan a type of Christian doctrine and form of ecclesiastical government that has found readiest acceptance among a people who are insistent on applying to everything occidental the standard of adaption to permanent national ideals and aims. Here too, is the seat of the ablest and most successful of recent envoys from the Vatican to the court of the Mikado.

It was from Boston and from Salem, in the earliest days and triumphs of American commerce on the Pacific and trade in the Far East, that men and ships went forth that opened the eyes of Asiatics to the profits there were in trade with this country, and to the character and ability, the enterprise and high standing of merchant and trader in the Occident.

Boston's organizations of merchants and captains of industry have invariably gone on record, in times of threatened friction between the United States and Japan, as utterly opposed to any course of discrimination that might sever the traditional friendship between the two Powers. They will welcome the opportunity, now at hand, for showing that the capital of New England has a cordial welcome for men who are leading a re-born nation along paths that must enrich not only Japan but all humankind.

The following despatch from New York tells of the ravages of the white plague in that city, and how it is proposed to cope with the terrible disease:—"A group of distinguished physicians and philanthropists, constituting the anti-tuberculosis commission, appeared before Mayor McClellan yesterday, and urged that \$487,000 be set aside by the board of estimates to reduce an economic loss estimated at \$15,000,000 yearly to this city alone caused by the ravages of tuberculosis. Robert W. DeForest, president of the Charity Organization Society, declared that of 44,000 tuberculosis sufferers in New York not 16,800 were receiving proper medical attendance, while there are, he said, 24,059 new cases and 10,000 deaths each year. Ferryboat clinics and class rooms for tuberculosis children excluded from the public schools were urged by Dr. Samuel Lambert, Dr. Abraham Jacobi recommended outdoor classes such as have been successfully maintained at Boston, Mass.; Providence, R. I.; and abroad."

IRISH LAND BILL PASSES. LONDON, Oct. 26.—The Lords passed the third reading of the Irish Land Bill in greatly amended form. Earl Crewe, Secretary of Colonies, in behalf of the Government protested against the amendments and expressed doubt as to whether the Commons would accept them.

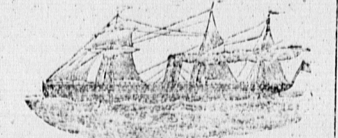
