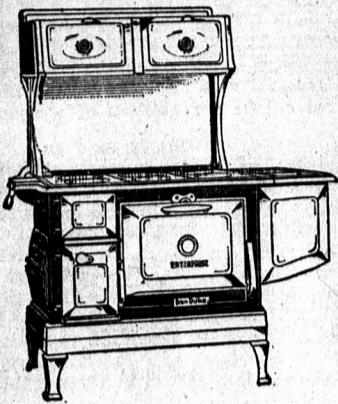

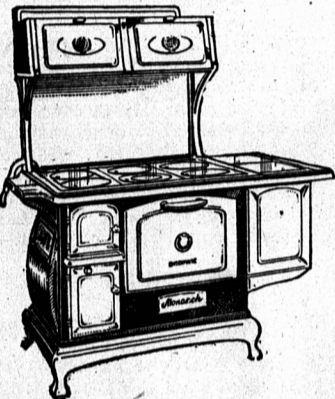

Bermuda Sending Veteran Players

(By The Canadian Press) TORONTO, July 21—Now playing in the United States the touring Bermudian cricket team, representative of the cricket clubs of the British Island colony of the west Atlantic, will open its Canadian tour in Montreal July 26.

With a scheduled embracing of Ontario and Quebec cities Bermuda will make its first assault on Canadian cricket honors since 1928 when a team from the colony made a very successful tour of eastern Canada.

The team on the present occasion is under the management of H. J. Hallett, vice president of the Bermuda Athletic Association. The roster, including spares, follows: L. Belvin, J. Marjra, J. Christensen, R. Christensen, A. Marjra, B. Tucker, J. Benedices, J. Hayward, H. J. Hallett, J. F. Murray, W. F. Hayward, A. Pitman, E. G. Felt, F. Hayward, A. Pitman and W. H. Hayward are the only members of the team who were also here in 1928.

Most of the touring Bermudians were members of the eleven which represented the island against the British team of Sir Julien Cahin in Bermuda in 1933 being defeated by the Cahin team by one wicket only. The British team visited Canada also on that occasion.

Arranged by Harry Dean of Toronto the feature of the Bermudians' games in Canada this year will be the match on August 5 at Arthur Heights, Toronto, between the tourists and an eastern Canadian eleven.

The home team with E. F. Loney as captain will be selected from the following: W. E. Bell, E. Carlton, L. C. Bell, P. F. Seagram, J. A. K. Rutherford, R. G. McLean, L. A. Percival and J. G. Percival of Toronto; R. H. Ross and M. I. Davies of Montreal and Arthur Youngman of Waterloo.

Continuing Rise In P. E. I. Oyster Catch

Following unfortunate mishance which virtually wiped out the stocks on important beds in the province some twenty years ago, Prince Edward Island's oyster production fell off sharply but it has been coming up again in the past few seasons and in 1934 it reached the highest figure since 1913, or 10,160 barrels.

Prospects are, moreover, that the next few years will see the upward trend continue, although some fluctuations, of course, are to be expected. One factor making for further increase is the growing public interest in the possibilities of the industry. For another thing, the action of the Dominion Department of Fisheries in encouraging and assisting oyster culture in the province has been bringing about an expansion of oyster "farming." The recent gains in production may be attributed in part, by the way, to the work which the department has been doing since 1928 when, by agreement between the federal and provincial governments, the division jurisdiction over the island's oyster areas was ended and full control was placed in the department's hands. Already some eighty approved areas are being cultivated as oyster farms by various people, who have leased suitable grounds from the department and are able to apply in their operations the results of the federal investigations and experiments as to the methods of oyster culture which are the best to follow in Prince Edward Island.

In 1913 the oyster landings of the province amounted nearly to 13,000 barrels, though truth to tell that total was bigger than usual. Then trouble came. Havoc was worked on certain of the best beds by an epidemic, which is believed to have been introduced by seed oysters brought from outside the island. In the ten years following 1913 the provincial catch averaged only 4,608 barrels a year.

The next year saw the average rise somewhat, but there were ups and downs from season to season, not a steady improvement. Beginning with 1931, however, the catch each year has been bigger than in the year before and the average production for the year period, 1931-1934, was 7,000 barrels, though it should be pointed out that last year the increase was much greater than in any of the three preceding seasons.

Money return from the fishery has been adversely affected by a downward trend in prices in the first two years of 1931-1934. An increased catch in 1931 was worth less in market value than the smaller catch of 1930, and there was a similar situation in 1932. In the next year, however, prices stiffened and a downward trend was further improved in this regard last year, although the price level was still below that of 1931. The aggregate marketed value of the 1934 landings was a little more than \$60,000, as compared with \$39,800 in 1931, when the catch was smaller but price per barrel higher.

Racing Pigeon Clubs Active

MONTREAL, July 22—Racing pigeon clubs all over Canada are very active at the present time and consequently racing-pigeon shipments are commencing to move in large quantities, according to G. E. Bellrose, General Manager of the Canadian National Express, which handles a considerable number of such shipments annually. THE BAPTIST CHURCH

It is not enough that we should just hold beliefs, however true, that we should just worship, however reverently, to be of its full value, our religion must be a source of power. It is essential if we are to have some of the effectiveness of First Century Christianity, that we should believe that power is a costly thing, the pearl of great price, discipline, complete consecration and that this spiritual power comes according to definite laws. "God has had all there is of me" was the answer of one in response to an inquiry. The world has been successful in reaching infinite power in the material. God calls His people to avail themselves of the infinite power that is offered through the Spirit.

Mr. V. L. Dingwell sang very effectively "Open the gates of the Temple." Mr. Eaton spoke at the evening service on The Goodness of God. The solo at the evening service was taken by Miss Jacqueline Macdonald.

CHINA ANXIOUS FOR EDUCATION

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., July 22—(C.P.)—For 24 years a medical missionary in Honan Province, China, Mrs. S. C. Ratcliffe is on a year's furlough and is visiting her sister, Mrs. W. J. Calla of this city.

She is greatly interested in health and education in China, and says the Central Government is trying to work out these problems. Education is making great strides under the wise guidance of General and Mrs. Chiang. Mrs. Chiang she said is one of the best-known women in the world and a foremost leader in women's work. She travels everywhere with her husband, flying with him to appointments, and is a real "aide" to the General.

Speaking of the hospitals in China, Mrs. Ratcliffe said there are 367 registered schools for nurses in the country, all with the same examinations. The Chinese nurses are intelligent and efficient and the hospitals are doing a great work. There are also regularly trained sanitary inspectors all over China, who have been given courses in schools.

The great difficulty which besets the efforts of missionaries is not others in the lack of money and sufficient trained workers. There are whole villages where the people cannot read or write.

"But with the admirable men and women engaged in the effort, who are in the highest degree efficient and capable, I can see China emerging from her difficulties and reaching a place on a par with the other nations," said Mrs. Ratcliffe.

Recent reports of world crop conditions would indicate fairly general unfavourable weather during the spring and early summer, according to the Agricultural Department of the Canadian National Railway.
