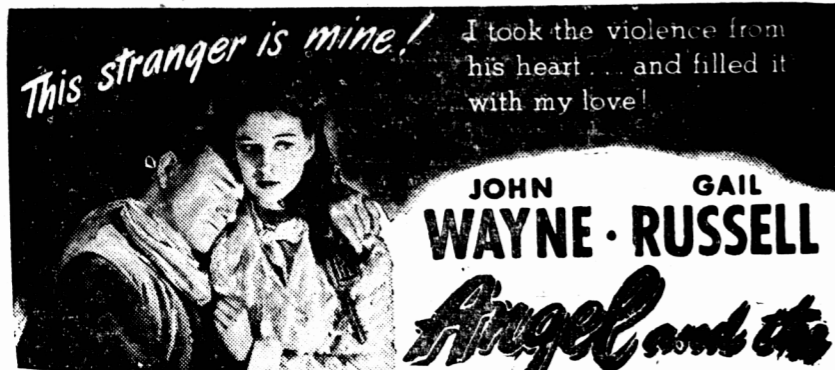

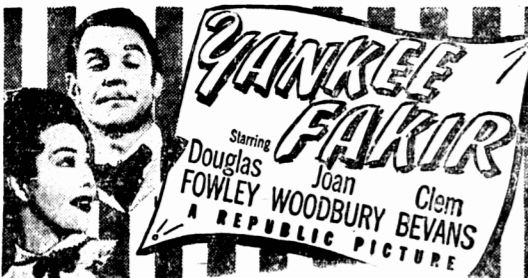

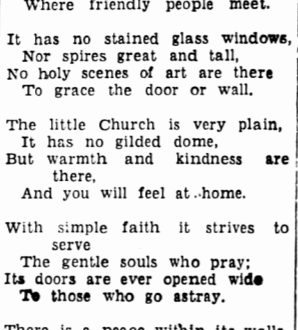

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Capt. Steele Veteran

Mariner Passes On

(Port Arthur, Texas Exchange)

Funeral services for Capt. R. D. Steele, one of the city's oldest and most colorful personalities who died Sunday at 8:35 p.m. in St. Mary's Hospital, will be held at St. James' Catholic Church Tuesday at 8 a.m.

Age Still Mystery

Rosary for Capt. Steele will be recited tonight at 8:30 p.m. in the Clayton and Thompson chapel by the Knights of Columbus of which he was an honorary life member.

Capt. Steele was active in the conduct of his business until he suffered a stroke of apoplexy Wednesday about 3 a.m. in his room at the Sabine hotel. His condition was considered serious from the beginning because of his advanced age, and he was moved to the hospital Saturday morning as he became weaker.

Capt. Steele's death has not solved the riddle of his age, which has caused considerable discussion here for several years.

Believed To Be 104

His family believes him to be 104 years old, judging from old affidavits and records, while an old Port Arthur "Who's Who" states he was born in 1846. He had been reticent about the matter for some years, but told a reporter on Dec. 24, 1941, that he was 93 years old on that day.

He was born in Cardigan, on Prince Edward Island, Canada, and went to sea at the age of 12. He became master of a schooner at 21, when sailing ships were still the only means of traversing the ocean. He was one of the last to give way to modern steamers.

Was in Fruit Trade

While a shipmaster, he was principally engaged in the fruit trade, with New York as his home port. The speed required for carrying such perishable cargo required full sail at virtually all times.

His career took him to most of the important ports of the world, and tales of his experiences entertained his family and friends for many years. Children were especially delighted and one remarked that "Pops" never had told the same story twice, a member of the family recalled today.

One especially interesting story concerned the wreck of his schooner "Ceres", on Oct. 12, 1892, on almost the spot on which Columbus landed in the New York exactly 400 years before.

Moved Here in 1899

Capt. Steele had "rounded the Horn" many times during his 45 years at sea.

He came to Sabine Pass in 1885, following his retirement as a master, and moved to Port Arthur in 1899, when only 18 houses had been constructed, to open a marine insurance office.

The firm, now known as Steele, Salter and Bunge, has maintained offices in the Adams building for many years where Capt. Steele reported daily for work. Well-known to shipping-men throughout the world, he held a commission as marine surveyor and correspondent from the N. Y. board of underwriters for many years.

Active in Civic Affairs

Always interested in the development of Port Arthur, he has provided one of the best sources of information on the early history of the town. He continued to advocate plans for the future of the area, having recommended shortly after Pearl Harbor that the government construct a shipbuilding yard here. Advantages, he pointed out, were that the geographical location would permit work to continue throughout the year, and that the soil lent itself to dredging operations.

He was active in civic affairs, having been a member of the Rotary club, the Santa Maria council, 1304, of the Knights of Columbus, which he had served as grand knight, and the Fourth Degree Assembly of the Knights of Columbus of which he was past faithful navigator. He was a member of the Catholic church.

His wife, the former Anna Teresa Duval of Brooklyn, N. Y., died in Brooklyn in 1896.

Survivors Listed

Surviving are two sons, John R. Steele, and Roderick D. Steele, Jr., both of Port Arthur; two daughters, Miss Edith M. Steele of Port Arthur and Mrs. Alton Fontenot, Eunice, La.; a sister, Mrs. Julia Steele O'Meara, Monticello, N. Y.; nine grandchildren, Ronald, Billie and Pat Steele, children of the late Charles A. Steele, all of Port Arthur; Mrs. Odie Beckam, Mrs. Ed Carey, Roderick D. Steele, III, and Mrs. Harris Grammer, children of R. D. Steele, all of Port Arthur; Mrs. Pacque Pucheu of New Orleans and Miss Germaine Fontenot of Eunice, children of Mrs. Fontenot, and five great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers will be selected from members of the Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus. Honorary pallbearers will be members of the Propeller club, and friends among shipping men throughout the Sabine area.
