WELCOMED HOME.—Among the boys returning home this week and receiving a very cordial welcome is Frank L. Pucher, Hillsboro Street, who has been through all the hardest fighting, and comes home looking exceptionally well. Gunner Pucher has the proud distinction of being one of triplets and the reunion with his two sisters and the other members of the family was the cause of much rejoicing and thankfulness. Gunner Pucher left Charlottetown on the old S. S. Cacoua on August 4th, 1914 for Canso where he was on garrison duty for some time. Later he went to Halifax and Fort Ives and joined the 11th ammunition column under command of Major D. A. McKinnon. He left Halifax for overseas April 1916 and after arriving in England was transferred to the 29th Howitzer Battery Field Artillery which arrived in France July 14th, 1916. He served with it at Ypres, Kemmel and the battles of the Somme but on the breaking up of that battery he was transferred to the 38th Battery in command of Major McKinnon and has taken part in all the great battles that this gallant officer has been engaged in among them being Vimy Hill 70, Paschaendale, Amiens, Arras, Drocourt-ineant, Cambrai. They fought from Valenciennes to Mons and through it all Gunner Pucher's longest leave was three days.
