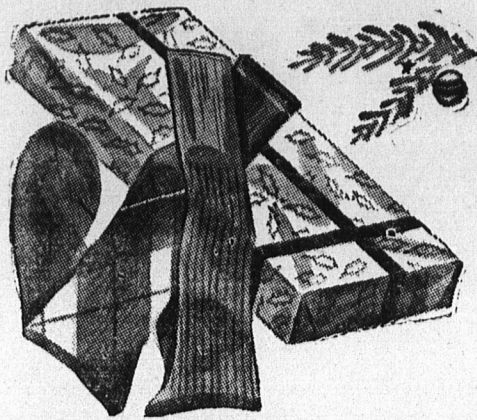

Exactly how far advanced British patrols had pushed or whether there had been any further major contact with the retreating Germans and Italians was not disclosed.

The only hint of an encounter was the announcement in a singularly brief communique that "in the course of the present phase of our advance 12 German tanks were destroyed and eight Italian medics taken captive."

It appeared that the pursuit had become such a race there was no time to get messages back reporting its progress step by step.

Again, both the general headquarters and Royal Air Force commandos stressed the havoc inflicted on long exposed lines of Axis motorized transport by incessant air attack.

The loss of 11 British planes was disclosed by the R. A. F. said that besides taking a heavy toll of machines and troops Imperial air forces had struck far behind the fighting zone in air assaults on air bases, railroads and transports in the far western Libyan province of Tripolitania.

British air superiority in North Africa is so firm, an air ministry news service report in London said, that bombers and fighters raked an Axis motor transport column "10 miles long" with bombs and machine-gun fire without interruption throughout Saturday.

A message of praise to his Mediterranean fleet, Admiral Sir Andrew Browne Cunningham declared that "when the tale of the siege of Tobruk comes to be written, the part played by these craft will prove to be a story worthy of the highest traditions of our naval history."

SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, Dec. 21—(CP)—Addressing officers of two Canadian regiments at a formal mess dinner, Viscount Bennett said "we believe victory will be achieved because we have not lost faith in Canada and the justice of our cause and ideals."

"You are here because you believe the things for which you are fighting must be preserved or else we will no longer have a place among the nations," he continued.

"You are offering your lives—your greatest sacrifice—for the preservation of an ideal."

ing for Hitler, told Germany candidly that her army in Russia is up against "an enemy superior in men and materials."

Since Nov. 29, when the Red army recaptured Rostov-on-Don, who capture the Germans exultantly had announced as opening the spigot to the Caucasus oil, Russian forces have risen in a general counter-offensive from Finland to the Black Sea.

Move dwelling At Fox Ranch

Mr. Fox MacLean and son, Dan, who have been in Charlottetown for the past four weeks, leave on return to their home in Murray's Bay this afternoon.

The company's property has been the scene of very active and strenuous work the past month with large gangs of men cutting down six and one-half acres of woods, part of which was stumped, the moving of the ranch keeper's house and garage, the removal of over 100 fox pens, taking down of over 2,000 feet of cedar to make a track for the digging of nearly a mile of trenches to accommodate a cable conveying electricity for the obstruction lights, which have been placed at various points on the property.

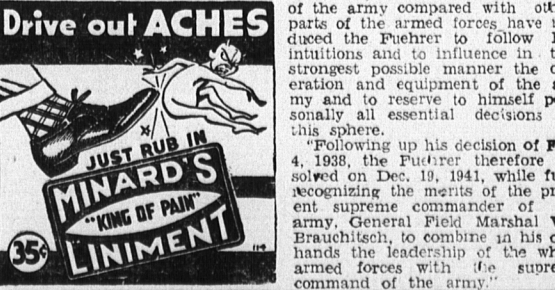
