Make Rows Straight and True in Victory Garden

Use Stakes and a Heavy Cord to Layout Your Garden Rows. To make a garden drill you need stakes and a heavy cord. These are as necessary in laying out a Victory garden as in laying out a house. The entire garden should be outlined so that the rows can be squared with the boundaries. Then place stakes for the first row, and stretch a line between them. Having stretched the line, what comes next? Seeds are sown in rows either in drills, or hills. A drill is a shallow continuous trench, while a hill is not an elevation, except in localities where the rainfall is heavy. It usually means a spot where several seeds are sown in a group, with the groups spaced at equal intervals in the row. The depth of the drill is important. You often read that seeds
