## Spring Will See Improved Conditions

SAINT JOHN, Oct. 21.—"I look for a gradual picking up during the Fall and winter months with conditions showing a definite improvement by spring," declared A. H. Grainger, general manager for The T. Eaton Co., Maritimes, Ltd., when asked to comment on the business outlook in eastern Canada, while in Saint John on Saturday to attend the funeral of W. Shives Fisher.

"The Maritime Provinces are very noticeably better off than the rest of Canada right now," he said. "Money is circulating quite freely and the process of recovery seems well established."

Explaining that the Maritimes do not normally experience the extremes of depression and prosperity to as great an extent as other parts of Canada, Mr. Grainger paid a tribute to the "staunchness of Maritime outlook."

"There is a feeling of steadiness and solidarity down here," he said, "that is most refreshing at a time such as this."

## Population Of Australia

SYDNEY, New South Wales, October 21.—(British United Press)—Statistics just issued by the Acting Commonwealth Statistician, Professor Gblin, show that at the end of 1930 the population of Australia reached a total of 6,476,032, representing an increase of 1,064,735 during the last ten years. To this total gain, natural increase (the excess of births over deaths) contributed 776,481, or 73 per cent, and net migration contributed 288,254, or 27 per cent.

Arriving very shortly after the accident, Hon. G. Shelton Sharp, Captain Reed and Mr. Robert Dewar rendered what assistance they could, the injured man being conveyed in Mr. Dewar's car to the hospital where Dr. Simpson, upon examination, found Mr. Waugh had received several scalp wounds and a badly fractured skull.

At a late hour last night Mr. Waugh had not recovered consciousness and little hope was entertained of his recovery.

Evidence of the course followed by the car driver after the collision showed that he swerved into the ditch and continued on into Mr. Philip McNally's field, knocking down a fence pole. The tracks showed that he made the turn and in coming out of the field again broke another pole and carried a length of fence wire with him some distance on the highway.

Mr. Waite, who walked his horse into Summerside and found the animal was not seriously hurt, was himself badly shaken up. He described the car as a large one, but could give no other information.

The police are diligently searching for the driver of the car. There were no eyewitnesses to the collision but it is believed the car may have been damaged sufficiently to afford a clue.

The grief and respect of the nation was let to be expressed in an organized plan sponsored by President Hoover for extinguishing for one minute at 10 p. m. (E.S.T.) the billions of incandescent electric light globes which light its ways because of Mr. Edison's genius.

Mourners at the home entered while an organ played "I'll Take You Home Again, Kathleen." Its soft strains mingled with the crackle of pine logs in a huge fireplace of the hall. Autumn sunlight drifted through a mass of window ferns.

Simplicity marked the rites. Arthur L. Walsh, old friend and business associate, played "Little Girl Home in the West" on the violin. It and "Kathleen" were the inventor's favorites and they were among the first songs made popular on the phonograph he created. Then there was music from Bach and Beethoven. He loved that, too. ## Canada Holds Fifth Place As Trade Nation

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 21.—Canada continued to hold her position as the fifth trading nation of the world in 1930, according to the annual report of the Department of Trade and Commerce issued here. In per capita trade among the world trading nations the Dominion had risen from seventh position in 1913 to fourth position in 1930, while gradually moving down the scale in per capita volume of importations.

In production and exportation of many staple products Canada ranks high among the principal nations, says the report. In the production of printing paper, nickel and asbestos the Dominion led all others. Canada is the world's second largest gold producing country, and in output of wheat and zinc holds third place.

As far as exports are concerned the Dominion leads the world in wheat, newsprint, nickel, and asbestos, is second in the export of automobiles and wheat flour, while ranking high in wood pulp, lumber, fish, copper, raw furs, etc.

Depressed values the world over are reflected in the trade figures for the current fiscal year. Reports issued today by the department show that for the first half of the fiscal year—April to September this

country imported commodities having a value of \$318,221,727 while the value of exports was \$295,516,898. The imports were about \$195,000,000 lower than for the corresponding period of 1930, and the export values dropped by about \$138,000,000.

## Fire On Prince Of Wales Ranch

EDMOND, Alta., Oct. 21.—Damage totalling \$18,000 was done by fire which razed two barns on the Prince of Wales ranch Monday near High River, Alta. The fire claimed the \$1,000 champion cow, Balcain Lavatera; the \$600 champion heifer, Princeton Lily; the \$600 yearling heifer, Princeton Jessie and seven young bulls.

Prof. W. L. Carlyle, manager of the ranch, believed that spontaneous combustion caused the outbreak. All the ranch hands battled the flames, but the high wind blocked their efforts and the fire spread rapidly. For twelve hours the fire was fought before it was prevented from spreading to other buildings of the ranch. Prof. Carlyle said the champion cow and heifers were being prepared for the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto.

## U. S. To Gain Big Revenue

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 21.—The railroads of the United States

yesterday lost their spectacular fight for a 15 per cent freight rate increase, but were given the encouragement of an interstate commerce commission proposal for specific increases to be pooled for the good of all. To provide money for lifting railroad bonds from their present

difficulties, the commission conditionally approved a schedule of surcharges, all less than 10 per cent, on such traffic as coal, steel, forest products, ores and oils. Rates on wheat, corn, cotton, livestock and fresh fruits—would be left undisturbed.

"The plan outlined, we estimate, will produce between one hundred million and one hundred twenty-five million dollars increased revenue on the basis of present traffic if applied both state and interstate. This should cover deficiencies in interest on fixed interest obligations with a substantial balance left over" the commission said.

## Maine Bank Closes Doors

FORT KENT, Maine, Oct. 21.—The Fort Kent Trust Company with a branch at Madawaska remained closed today following a petitioning into bankruptcy yesterday by State Bank Commissioner Sanger B. Annis.

The receivership was granted by Chief Justice Pataingall at Augusta yesterday and the commissioner was named receiver. Mr. Annis issued the following statement:

"Owing to continued withdrawal of funds by depositors the bank has reached the limit of its cash resources. In order to conserve the assets and protect depositors the commissioner petitioned for the appointment of a receiver."

The closure was the first time in four years a Maine bank failed to open its doors for business. The Fort Kent Trust Company was organized in 1903. In its last published statement last March, the bank listed assets of \$982,116.44. Demand deposits were \$167,202.76, and savings deposits \$529,885.40.

## Child Slays Leopard

BURBAN, South Africa, October 21.—A native child of 12, single-handed, stabbed and killed a full-grown leopard, saving the life of another native who had attempted to kill the

beast, but had only succeeded in wounding it.

The leopard, who nightly prowled about a village on the outskirts of Durban, was known to have carried away many domestic animals and dogs. One night a hunt was organized, and a pack of dogs cornered the leopard. A native flung a spear, wounding the animal, which attacked him. It was then that the child grabbed a spear from a bystander and, rushing in, drove the weapon through the leopard's body.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 21. (A.P.)—Movements under Chinese, Mongol, and Manchurian sponsorship to separate the vast area of Manchuria from the rest of China were reported today developing spontaneously in various parts of the "three eastern provinces."

Exact information, however, still was lacking. The few dispatches reaching here were from Japanese sources, since the Chinese no longer control the Manchurian communications systems.

Chinese officials continued to allege and Japanese spokesmen to deny that the movements for Manchurian autonomy are encouraged by the Japanese government.
