Weather won't Simplify attack Squee Allen's Condition good

TORONTO, Dec. 4.—(CP)—Coach Alex Ponton of Toronto Balmy Beach said tonight he will not try to simplify his attack to conform with adverse weather conditions expected for this Saturday's meeting with Ottawa Rough Riders in Ottawa in the second game of the home-and-home, total-point series for the Canadian Rugby Union championship.

Dutton Seeks Replacements For Amerks

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—(CP)—Red Dutton, who has seen his early-season hopes go awry in a flurry of injuries—and opponents' goals today set out on a journey through the American League to seek possible replacements for his New York Americans club of the National Hockey League.

The team Dutton put together to form a judicious mixture of youngsters and veterans has won only three games, lost eight and drawn one. Four of his players have suffered injuries. The immediate futures does not look rosy.

Dutton's one bright spot today was that his team, which yielded 22 goals in losing the last three games, has a rest until Dec. 12 when it plays Chicago at Madison Square Garden here.

Tonight Dutton planned to watch Springfield Indians of the American League perform at Hershey, Pa. Then he will continue with the team for its next game at Cleveland.

The New York club has three players on loan to Springfield: Andy Brannigan, promising young defenseman, Fred Hunt, right winger who is among the top scorers of the circuit and Charley Rayner, young goalie, who gave a good account of himself in a National League game against Toronto after goalie Earl Robertson was hurt.

Kenesaw Landis Will get wish

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 4.—(AP)—Kenesaw Mountain Landis, Commissioner of Baseball, will get his wish tomorrow—a small Georgia farm within sight of the historic mountain for which he was named.

Two years ago, when the National Association of Professional Leagues met in New Orleans, Landis told President Trammell Scott of the Southern Association:—

"Some day I would like to retire to a little farm where I can look out and see Kenesaw Mountain."

Scott spoke to Mayor Blair of Marietta, Ga., not far from the mountain where Blair, fighting with tonight's bloody fight took place in the Civil War. Blair, in turn, spoke to his city council, and the body arranged to present to Landis a modest tract near Kenesaw Mountain.

So tomorrow, accompanied by Mayor William B. Hartford of Atlanta, and Major Scott, Landis will go to Marietta to receive a deed in a brief ceremony at the city park.

Commissioner Landis was named for the mountain by his father, a member of the Union forces, who lost his leg in the hostilities nearby. The variation between the spelling of the name of the man and the mountain was due to errors in dispatches reaching the north after the battle.

Racing plant Endangered by Overheated stove

AUGUA CALIENTE, Mex., Dec. 4.—(AP)—The \$2,000,000 Caliente racing plant was endangered today by fire, which caused more alarm than damage.

Evidently started from an overheated stove, the flames were kept in check by a bucket brigade of stable hands until the Tijuana department arrived. Major damage was to feed and harnesses.

REMEMBER WHEN

SPAIN SHORTENS LEISURE HOURS

MADRID, Dec. 4.—(CP)—The government has decided, in order to economize on coal and electricity, to make the leisurely Spanish people change their established habits of keeping late hours.

The decision, to date limited to a brief announcement that hours will be changed to rear range, the theatre and sit in cafes, brought widespread public speculation.

Spanish life is now geared much later than life in the rest of Europe. Most office work is done in the afternoon and evening. Spaniards eat luncheon at 2:30 or 3 p.m., dine at 10:30 and go to the theatre at 11. They usually are in their favorite cafes at 2 or 3 A.M.

Sox teams put Deal on shelf

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 4.—(AP)—Chicago White Sox and Boston Red Sox made a baseball deal tonight—and then put it on the shelf—that would send outfielder Doc Cramer to Chicago for outfielder Mike Kreevich in a straight swap.

Manager Jimmy Dykes of the White Sox and manager Joe Cronin of the Red Sox held a long huddle and when they finished said they had agreed on the trade, except that Dykes said the deal would have to be approved by Vice President Harry Garbner before it was completed.

Just what happened then was not immediately known, but the two clubs concerned decided to withhold final approval of the trade until a later time, possibly tomorrow or maybe next week at the major league meeting in Chicago.
