Coal Output Gradually Increases

MONTREAL, Oct. 24.—(C.P.)—Consideration has been given to a plan designed to take care of arrears on the preferred stock of Dominion Coal Company but the company has a number of proposals requiring solution before such a plan can be submitted to preference shareholders, Sir Newton Moore, President of the company and also of Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation stated here tonight.

The coal company had enjoyed a notable expansion in business this year, a recent report indicating that the two Cape Breton coal companies would mine in 1934 5,000,000 tons compared with 3,500,000 in 1933.

Steel mills of the corporation accounted for a substantial amount of the increased output of coal. Last year the shipment to the St. Lawrence to Quebec and Ontario took care of an additional 1,000,000 tons over last year.

Sir Newton said there was an encouraging activity in the Cape Breton industrial area. While all branches of the steel plant were not equally busy, operations as a whole were at approximately 60 per cent of capacity. At the Dominion collieries there was full time production at approximately 100,000 tons per week.

Recent strikes, he said, had curtailed shipments of coal to the St. Lawrence district, at an important time in the shipping season, but he indicated efforts were being made to catch up on the loss.

CONRAD'S OLD VESSEL IS SCUTTLER AT SEA

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 23.—Sixty-three years ago a small sailing ship of 348 tons, the Otago, left Liverpool for Port Chalmers, New Zealand. She did the voyage in the almost record time of 85 days, and many were the yarns told of her, both in the town and at her destination.

Now she has been taken out to sea for the last time and scuttled. It did not pay to break her up. But her past was a tale of romance. She was once the command of Joseph Conrad, and she is mentioned in his books "The Mirror of the Sea," "Falk," and "The Shadow Line."

Built in 1869, she put up some fine performances. Once she sailed 306 miles in 24 hours. Her last days were spent as a coast guard cutter in the Pacific, a battered but proud vessel.

Former Islander Dies at Trochu, Alta.

TROCHU, Alta., Sept. 8.—Death stalked through the ranks of old pioneers here Thursday when Gordon Roberts, a resident of 37 years standing, died suddenly following a heart attack. He had been ailing for a few days but apparently had not taken his illness seriously as he died while visiting at the home of W. Donor, a friend who lives just north of town.

The funeral was held from the family residence Saturday morning with Rev. Young of the United Church officiating.

A native of Prince Edward Island, the late Mr. Roberts came to Alberta in 1903 and settled at Olds, where he lived for a short time before moving to Trochu. He was engaged in farming and was also associated with the late Mayor Eckenfelder in the cattle business.

A public-spirited man he served for a number of years on the village council and on the local school board.

Besides his wife, he is survived by eight children, Mrs. L. Theray of Parsons, B.C.; Robert and Roy, teachers in the district; and Lettie, Hazel, George, Verma and Glen, all living at home.

IT ISN'T THE DISTANCE BUY TRIP ONE FALLS THAT SPELLS DISASTER

BOSTON, Oct. 23.—Henry Sherman, 23, rolled through a bedroom window early to-day while asleep, fell 18 feet to the ground, and city hospital doctors could find no serious injuries.

Daniel Beadon, 65, a native of Antigonish, N. S., was not so fortunate. He fell on his bedroom floor and died three hours later of a fractured skull.

PROTEST AGAINST SOCIETY GIRLS AS FASHION MODELS

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—New York's professional models, who paraded before society's notables, are threatening to go on the picket line—against society itself.

Titan-haired Gertrude Mayer, Fifth Avenue model menter, tapped a tiny shoe foot indignantly today as she protested against Park Avenue deb and sub-debs, whom she accused of taking jobs away from the professionals.

Miss Mayer's complaint against these society girls is two-fold:—
1. They are not good models. They are taking modelling jobs not only in charity fashion shows, she said, but in the shops as well, cutting into their poorer sisters' means of livelihood.
2. They are not good models. Therefore they are lowering the standards of the business.

"They don't know how to do justice to the garments they are showing," said Miss Mayer. "They don't know how to walk. They have no balance. They don't know what to do with their hands. They don't know how to lift their clothes and show them off properly."

Miss Mayer, who came from Paris and eight years ago founded what she claimed was the first training school for models in the United States said she planned to call a meeting of professional models next week for a discussion of plans to combat the "debutante menace."

She will propose a personal appeal to society leaders, and if that fails the professional models will be asked to picket the next fashion show.

Miss Mayer estimated that easily 1,000 jobs have been filled during the last year by society girls.

NAME ROSE AFTER MARINA

LONDON, Oct. 24.—A new rose, shown for the first time at the National Rose Society show at Horticultural Hall, Westminster, has been named "Princess Marina." It has velvety salmon petals tinged with orange.

The rose was grown out of doors and had never been watered by man. "We have been so short of water in our village," H. Robinson of Burbage, Leicestershire, the grower, told a reporter, "that we have not been able to use any water in the greenhouse."

Unlike most new roses, "Princess Marina" has a scent, and was all the more conspicuous in a show that is almost scentless.

RESERVE NINE

RESERVE NINE, Oct. 24.—(C.P.)—Struck by falling stone, Isadore Martin, 50, was killed instantly in Reserve Colliery early tonight. His neck was broken. A native of Prince Edward Island, Martin came to Cape Breton many years ago to work in the mines. He was unmarried.

COAL SLIDE Kills Three Boys

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Oct. 24.—Fifteen hundred tons of anthracite and gravel, toppling 50 feet, late today took the lives of three Plains Township youths culling coal for use by their impoverished parents.

Two other youths from Plains were hurt and about half dozen others fled safely before the avalanche at the Gilm bank of the Henry colliery of the Lehigh Valley coal company, near Wilson corner.

Whether any coal pickers remained under the fall tonight was uncertain but a steam shovel and a force of volunteer workers continued to labor moving the tons of debris.

The dead were: Joseph Prawdick, 12; John Conti, 16; William Dvornicky, 14.

BED-BUG VICTIMS MUST GET SLEEP

OSHAWA, Ont. Oct. 23.—Night sessions of City Council will be out of order from now on because the council would disturb sleeping firemen, forced by an epidemic of bed-bugs in the fire hall to use the council chamber as a dormitory.

Several members of the fire department required medical attention so voracious were the insects. As a last effort to rid the place of the nuisance Chief Elliott ordered the plaster torn from the walls and ceiling so the lath and wood work could be sprayed with disinfectant.

The entire room is now being plastered and painted.

At present there is about five months supply on hand at the mill.

SYDNEY, N.S., Oct. 24.—(C.P.)—Planning to celebrate Sydney's 150th anniversary next summer, a general meeting of citizens tonight decided to make this period from July 31 to Aug. 7 a "grand old home week."

Five committees and 30 sub-committees are being organized, and one committee will have the task of cleaning up the waterfront, which D. H. Bonnell described tonight as "a doleful picture and little more than a graveyard for derelict marine craft." Owners of the old hulls will be asked to remove them, and the city will be dressed up as nicely as possible for the large number of visitors expected for the celebration.
