 LONDON, Sept. 19—(CP Cable)—Three of the 50 teams making up the football league north remained undefeated Saturday as the first month of the new soccer season ended.  
 The unbeaten and untied trio are Sunderland, Blackpool and Aston Villa. Sunderland rose into a tie for the top position by defeating Hartlepool 3-0 before a home crowd of 10,000.  
 Biggest crowd of the day, 18,000 saw Blackpool edge out Manchester City 2-1. Aston Villa trounced Wolverhampton 4-1 before 12,000.  
 Burnley dropped from the top rung by drawing 1-1 with Bury and in other matches Leicester defeated Sheffield Wednesday 3-1 and Liverpool whipped Wrexham 5-2.  
 Nottingham Forest crashed into the victory column with a bang after three defeats by smashing Lincoln 8-1.  
 Reading and Queen's Park Rangers remained undefeated in the League South. Reading trounced Crystal Palace 5-1 and Rangers won their first game in the League champion last season, stayed near the cellar by losing 2-1 to Jowly Portsmouth.  
 Other South matches saw Alder shot defeat Luton 2-1, Fulham trounce Millwall 4-1, and Tottenham and West Ham drew 3-3, before 18,000.  
 Bristol leaped into a first-place tie with Lovell's Athletic in the league west by edging out Cardiff 2-1 while Lovell's was losing 3-2 to Aberman.  
 The Scottish League served up a spate of goals. Glasgow Rangers, leaders of the Scottish southern circuit, blasted third Lanark 6-0 with a newcomer, MacIntosh, their centre forward, scoring four.

 charger and 100 octane gasoline, scientific checks are being run on new engine, plane and flying device. It is here that reports from the battery are being analyzed for possible improvements in design and performance and where enemy equipment is taken apart and studied by experts.  
 A Canadian-made Mosquito bomber was at Wright Field and American officers who had tested it said it had lived up to every one and was, in their opinion, outstanding in its class. A close inspection is maintained between Canadian and American officers at Wright Field and Canadian-made equipment, especially in engine parts and propellers, is tested in some of the \$10,000,000 worth of scientific apparatus.  
 When enemy flying equipment is salvaged, it is sent to Wright Field for tests and examination. It was found, for instance, that the best engine used by the Japanese in their Zeppelin corresponded to a 1936 American model, developing only 900 horsepower.  
 But the biggest function of Wright Field is the development of new equipment. Flying machines and years ahead of production schedules. Engines that are in the dream class are on drafting boards, designed to horsepower, rating and performance schedule that are simply fantastic, but it may be years before they go into production.

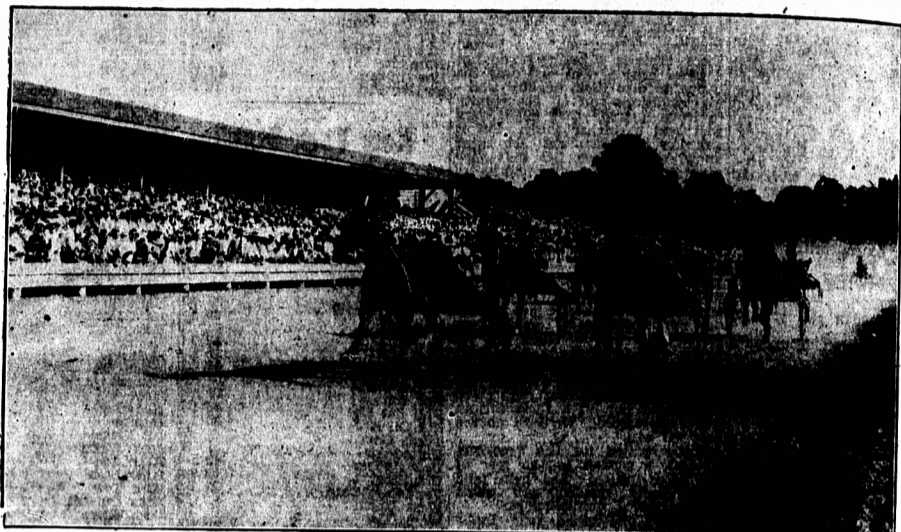
## Pilot Requirements

At Maxwell Field, a training school, flying cadets go through some of their pre-flight work. Under the American army system it takes almost a year to train a pilot, including five months in a university studying mathematics, basic engineering and other kindred subjects, before they sit in a plane. To be a pilot, a candidate must be no older than 27.  
 American officers claim their system produces the best-trained pilots in the world because of its thoroughness, length and educational standard. In saying that, they emphasize they are making no invidious comparisons with Canadian training methods for which they have the highest commendations and many of which they have copied or adapted into their own system. They claim, however, their training methods are proving satisfactory in the skies of Europe and Asia as more and more graduates meet the stern test of war.
