THE LONE DOVE—Mr. Reginald G. Pope, Summerside, lone aviator with his tiny silver monoplane, which he made himself, even to the wings, in his own workshop, gave an interesting exhibition of his ability and skill in handling his plane, during the intervals at the horse races on Saturday. The spectators were thrilled with his manoeuvres. It was a pretty sight to watch him take off and circle round the harbour landing with perfect ease upon his return. This intrepid aviator can be seen any day flying over town and harbour, often going out of sight above the clouds. A recent visitor to Summerside was surprised to learn, after enquiring, that the lone flyer had built, unassisted, the tiny machine he was flying, and with only a few lessons had flown last summer to Moncton to have his plane tested. The Moncton airport officials pronounced the machine perfect and a marvel of ingenuity. Fitted to the aeroplane are skis for ice landing wheels for summer and pontoons for landing on the water. The town of Summerside and the province might well be proud of the fact that Mr. Pope is the first man in the Maritimes to build and fly his own machine. Flying is a hobby with him and he is very modest about his achievement. The citizens of Summerside have become so accustomed to seeing Mr. Pope in his plane, that the old saying, "A prophet is not without honor save in his own country," is applicable to him, but visitors are quick to recognize his achievement.—S

Charges Sister With Serious Crime

(Canadian Press) WINDSOR, N. S., Feb. 8.—Mrs. Bessie Matheson, charged with "wounding with intent to maim" her brother, Robert Aker, was committed for trial today by Magistrate W. O. Dunlop.

Evidence recorded at the preliminary hearing was to the effect that on the night of January 26, Robert Aker answered a knock at his door and was greeted by a blow on the head from a hatchet. He grappled with his assailant, whom he said he recognized as his sister, and put her out of the porch. A few minutes later he heard glass crashing, and according to witnesses who were standing on the street, a woman was wielding a hatchet to break windows in the Aker house. Robert Aker said he then put her off the premises and she returned to kick in a front window. She was arrested later that night. Mr. Aker had a wound on his forehead but it was not serious.

Halifax Tonnage Shows Increase

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, N. S., Feb. 8.—Total cargo tonnage handled over Halifax harbour commissioners' piers for the week ending January 29 totalled 31,240 tons, as compared with 29,994 tons for the corresponding week of 1931.

Since January 1st, the total tonnage for 1932 amounts to 89,213 tons, as compared to 78,809 tons for the same period of 1931.

The total of 31,240 tons handled during the week ending January 29 constitutes a record week since January 1930.
