The following letter has been received by Miss McDonald, of North Biver, from her nephew, Wellington Cook:

O. BATTERY, R. H. ART, ELF DEEL, IN MIDDLEBURG, July 29th, 1900.

DEAR AUNT,—It is a long time since I have heard from anyone from home, but then I could hardly expect anything different, as a couple of months ago, De Wet burned four weeks mails of ours and then again, to-day, we hear that he has captured and burned another train full. So I expect some of my letters from home were destroyed at either one time or the other. I, myself, am in splendid health now, I never felt better. I suppose you know that I have been promoted to Sergeant. A Sgt. in my Battery was killed in the attack on Johannesburg and they promoted me in his place. Strange to say (the Battery) are stationed now about 100 miles east of Pretoria, near the Delagoa Bay Railway Line. I can really give you no information as regards the termination of the war. We know nothing of what the remainder of the Army is doing and can scarcely tell you why our own Column is here; but we have heard on several occasions that the Boers are heartily sick of it. We hope the remainder will give up shortly, as I believe we have most of their supplies cut off. This is Sunday—just the same as a week day, only we attend voluntary church service in Camp to-night. We have had no mails for a very long time and hope to hear from home soon now.
