Yesterday's Horse Racing At The Exhibition

A fine afternoon and a fairly fast track greeted the opening afternoon's racing yesterday. The attendance was about as usual, upwards of two thousand being seated on the Grand Stand.

Two classes were on the programme, namely the 2.15 trot with four starters and the 2.25 pace with seven starters. The entry list was considerably larger for each stake but training and race tactics accounted for a large number of absentees, including Colonel Waltz, 2.16 1/4, so well known to local race goers who is temporarily out of it due to a strain.

The 2.15 Trot. This was the first event called by Starter Frank Power, who is ably officiating. Four horses answered the bell. Colorado L., 2.13, owned by Mr. Hammond Kelly; Belle Rico, 2.16 1/4, owned by Mr. W. B. McArthur; Harry T., 2.16 1/4, owned by Mr. John Rooney; and Gay Moko, 2.16 1/4, owned by Mr. E. Redding.

Colorado L. was the most liked by those who picked the winners, and he was thought to have a cinch on first, because of his unbroken chain of victories on the Cape Breton Circuit. However, it developed into quite a horse race, the Colorado L. horse being forced to extend himself to the limit.

First Heat. Harry T. drew the pole and had the lead to the first turn, but made a break there and lost so much ground that he was distanced. Colorado L. and Miss Belle Rico made a hard race of it to the 3/4 pole where Colorado drew ahead and finished comfortably in 2.15 1/4. Gay Moko distanced. The driver of Harry T. claimed interference by the driver of Miss Belle Rico. The Judges allowed the claim and permitted him to start in the second heat.

Second Heat. This was the heat that made the "worth while" excitement. At the score Colorado L. was going 2.10 to the pace, etc., and at the word "go" shifted into a break, losing so much distance that he was hopelessly out of it. The battle centered between Harry T. and Miss Belle Rico, the former fairly and evenly outrotting the mare, but winning only by inches bringing the whole Grand Stand on their feet. Time, 2.17 1/4, the fastest of the race.

Driver Rooney and his horse, Harry T., received an ovation as they passed the stand. Harry T. is a wonderful horse to come back after a week of eight years retirement from the racing game.

The Third Heat. Everyone realized that the race would be between Colorado L. and Harry T., as Miss Belle Rico was not as good as usual.

Colorado was by a length going away, Harry and Belle racing up on them, passed Belle and coming into the home stretch overtook Harry, beating him by half a length in 2.18 1/4. Driver Cameron at the request of Mr. Rooney drove Harry T. in the fourth heat, but with the same result, Colorado winning, but by a very narrow margin.

THE 2.25 PACE. Had seven starters, three of them graduates of the Maine tracks and constant winners over the Maine Circuit, twice around all season. Sacharose, 2.14 1/4 is the most noted of the trio. She having annexed nine firsts and outclassed all the 1921 low class pacers quite comfortably. She is ably seconded by Northern Lily, 2.15 1/4, who has a formidable record; also Billy O'Donna, 2.15 1/4, who was a starter but was withdrawn on account of lameness in the second heat.

The Race. There was nothing to it for first place, but Sacharose, owned by G. M. Colbath, of Presque Isle, Maine, and driven by the veteran John Willard. The interest centered in the fight for positions, Northern Lily getting second in each heat, Miss Simassie third and Albert J. fourth. Miss Simassie driven by M. F. Boutillier, went a splendid race considering it was the second start of her career. Best time, 2.15 1/4.

Today's Races

A Few Notes About Horses That Start in the Various Races

Today's races will comprise a programme of three classes and will be in the start, with the classes are filled with horses which are evenly matched, thus insuring close finishes.

The 2.30 Class will be the first event called, the horses starting for the first heat at 2 p. m. This class will face the heat: Chimo, Tell Jr., who has won considerable reputation on the Maine and New Brunswick circuit and has a heat record of 2.15 1/4. He is an erratic horse and it is doubtful whether he can win. Alito the Great will be in the start, piloted by ex-Mayor Brown. Miss Elred, 2.18 1/4, owned by J. L. Smith, of Kinkora, is in fine shape and may be depended upon to put up a good race. Harry G. will be driven by Frank Boutillier and Frank says he is out to win in the heat, if possible. Juanita Aubrey makes the fifth starter. She recently worked a mile in 2.19 quite handsomely and many think she can win.

2.19 Trot.—This race will have five good horses. Brenton H., 2.18 1/4, owned by Henry Hooper, is in the form of his life and Henry says that he is going to win in straight heats. Henry is a veteran of the turf and has many friends who will cheer him from the grand stand. Miss Belle Rico will be driven by her owner, W.B. McArthur. She will be in better shape from her race of yesterday and will make a great contest with Brenton and others. The really dark horse is Usicka, owned by Dr. F. W. Christopher. This mare is thought to be capable of a mile in 2.15. She won a heat at Fredericton last year in 2.17 1/4 quite easily, and she is right on edge now. Other starters will be the British Soldier and Gay Moko. The above race will certainly be well worth going to see.

The 2.12 Pace.—This has six good horses—all horses that have world wide reputations on the race track, driven by the ablest drivers of the Maritime turf. The outstanding horse is Roy Volo, 2.08 1/4, who held the Maritime record this summer a 7/11 recently. He is in the form of his life and will be driven by Fred Cameron. Prince

Peppin, 2.09 1/4 is a Maine horse with a formidable reputation and with strong backing. John A. Hal, 2.07 1/4, has improved wonderfully of late and his owner thinks he has a chance. Then there is the redoubtable Pearn Hal, 2.05 1/4, owned by Dr. McAllister. This mare made the track pacing record of 2.12 1/4 last fall when she defeated Roy Volo, White Sox and others. She is good. Other entries will be White Sox and Edna Hamlin two local horses which will carry a lot of local sympathy.
