spring are to be harvested this fall; already some sample lots of these have been shipped to the Montreal and Quebec markets. The reception they meet with, whether they shall class as "Malpeques" or as "Rhode Islands" remains to be determined and on this result will depend the returns from the expected harvest of this year. Whether the three-year-olds to be harvested next year will have acquired the coveted flavor of the Malpeques is still problematical. There is even some uncertainty as to whether United States oysters shall reproduce in P. E. Island waters. These and other uncertainties beset the industry at its commencement although assurances are not wanting that there are good prospects of overcoming them in the end. With these problems not definitely solved however, it will be seen that those who invest their money in the undertaking are entitled to all possible protection and support, and that an industry which promises so bountifully for the province at large, as well as for those directly interested, deserves as much encouragement as is so freely and properly held out to induce foreign capital to invest itself here.

The last quarter of the moon will be on Tuesday, Sept. 23rd, at 8:30 a. m. The length of today will be twelve hours and ten minutes.

ABBIES ARE CHAMPIONS OF THE BASEBALL LEAGUE

On Saturday afternoon the final game of baseball for the championship of the Charlottetown Baseball League took place and resulted in a victory for the Abbeys by the decisive score of 11-3.

Play started at 4 o'clock, the Connaughts won the toss and sent the Abbeys first to bat. McCarey took some time to get in real working order, with the result that the Abbeys ran up a large number of runs in the early innings, almost all the scores being made in the first three innings. Hazard started the ball a-rolling and immediately got to first on a nice high ball to right field and afterward stole second. Whitlock was fanned. L. Campbell got to first, while Hazard went to third. Ches. Vanderstine was put out at first and while he was up the catcher failed to stop one of McCarey's speedy ones, with the result that Hazard went home for the first run of the day. Gass came next and put out a nice grounder on which "Lou" scored number 2. Hughes was put out at first, retiring the side. The Connaughts' first man, McAleer, then came to bat and was fanned. He was succeeded by L. Newsom who got safely to first and on an overthrow reached third. Fred Moore was then up and in getting first run for the Conns. McCarey, the next man, was caught out by Campbell, retiring the side and the first innings ended, Abbeys, 2; Connaughts, 1.

In the second innings the Abbeys were all shut-out by McCarey's excellent slab-work. Sweeney, the first Connaught up, and one of the best players in the League, sent out a dandy for a two-bagger. E. McCarey and Ted. Moore fanned. McInnis, the old football star, who had to replace one of the Connaught's regular team who could not get out, was next and hit a beauty to the back of the field, on which Sweeney got home. Cullen fanned, retiring the side for the second inning. Score: 2-2.

In the third inning the Abbeys got a batting streak which practically clinched the game for them. Hazard again swatted out a beauty on which he reached 1st and on an overthrow barely succeeded in getting home. Campbell, next, got to 1st, stole 2nd and 3rd and when Ches reached first safely Lou went home for another run. "Ches" stole 2nd and Gass got safely to first. Hughes also reached the initial sack on a dandy high ball to left field; when Ches got home for another run. In the meantime, Gass reached 3rd. Taylor fanned. B. Vanderstine, who, if he continues to improve, will be claiming some of the honors from "Ches," came up next and drove out a nice two-bagger, on which Gass got home. J. Gordon, the Abbeys' star hockey player, came to bat and gained first, while Hughes got home and Vanderstine got to 3rd. Hazard, up again, repeated his former trick, driving the ball

back in the field on which Vanderstine and Gordon both got home. Whitlock fanned, retiring the side. The Conns met with hard luck in this inning, when Newsom batted a good one which Hughes caught nicely and lined to first for a double play. Moore next put one right in to Gass's mit, retiring the side for the 3rd inning. Score: Abbeys, 9; Connaughts, 2.

The Abbeys ran in two more in the fourth. B. Vanderstine started the fifth and put one to Newsom for a put-out. Gordon fanned. Hazard lined out a low, hot one, getting first and then stealing second. Whitlock was the next batter and knocked a hot one at Newsom who put one to Fred Moore who held it in his glove for the last put-out. The first two Connaughts did not reach first. Corrigan was the third man and tapped "Lou" for a nice grounder, on which he got first. McAleer came next and obtained a good hit, on which he got second and Corrigan got home with the last run for his team. Newsom popped an easy fly into "Gus's" mit, retiring the side. McCarey got in some fine work in this inning, not allowing a man to get to first. The seventh saw no scoring and thus the game ended in the Abbeys' favor and also giving them the championship of the Charlottetown Baseball League.

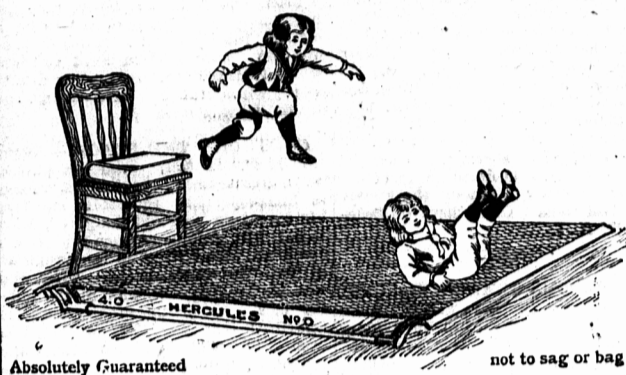
