BUENOS AYRES, July 5.—The Italian steamer Belluno has arrived here from Genoa flying the red flag of Communism aloft, and the Italian flag at her stern. The vessel is manned by a Communist crew who operate the ship on a basis of equality, from Captain to cabin boy, with the exception that powers have been delegated to a few

She was greeted with tooting of whistles by harbor tugs, many of which flung out red flags and escorted the Belluno to her pier, where great demonstrations were staged by 5,000 port workers of the Buenos Aires Maritime Federation. Mr. Mash the berries and let stand overnight with the sugar. In the morning rub through a sieve, and add the milk. Fold this mixture into the cream, which should be whipped stiff, and pour into a mold. Cover tightly and bury in equal parts of ice and salt for four hours. Open and stir after the second hour. This is not a genuine mousse, which is a much richer and smoother ice, but is a most satisfactory substitute.
