TWO CANADIANS SENTENCED TO HARD LABOR

(By Dominion News Service)

LONDON, June 19—(George William Wilkinson, chemist, and Ralph Entwistle, clerk, two Canadians, who refused any information about themselves and admitted that those names were fictitious were sentenced to nine months hard labour at Preston, for breaking into Hurovrod Hall, Padham, and stealing \$155.

It was stated that, smearing a sheet of brown paper with molasses, the prisoners broke the drawing room window, stole articles, and then forcing the cellar door, stole and consumed large quantities of wine and liquors. Later they were seen staggering intoxicated through the village of Padham.

Appealing for leniency the prisoners said they had hitherto unblemished characters. "We were unable to obtain employment," they stated. "We have been sleeping in filthy verminous casual wards, and faced with a 240 trap to London docks, yielded to temptation. You will never regret giving us a fresh start. We will work our passage back to Canada, and upon arrival we can obtain assistance from the Great War Association.

LIMERICK, June 19.—Addressing a large gathering here today President Cosgrave said that Ireland had taken the first forward step in its new sphere in the nationhood of the world. While the government was willing to forget the troubles of the last twelve months, it would take no risks regarding the established sovereignty of the principle.

"If there is a threat of war we will meet it," he declared. "We regret the action of the northern government in remaining outside the Free State; we want a united Ireland and brotherly co-operation from all."

BANTING DECLARES DIABETES PATIENTS CAN TREAT SELVES

MONTREAL, June 19.—Dr. F. G. Banting, of Toronto, discoverer of the insulin treatment for diabetes, discussed his remedy before the Canadian Medical Association convention here this afternoon. He said that a diabetic patient, after two or three weeks spent in the hospital, could be taught to cure himself, but his case must be thoroughly and accurately diagnosed beforehand.

Winnipeg's experience of ancephalitis or sleeping sickness was described by Dr. William Boyd, of that city. He outlined several curious symptoms of the disease which of late years has attacked the western provinces.

Other physicians to address the convention included Dr. B. L. Wyatt, director of the Laurentide health service on "Industrial Medicine"; Dr. K. A. MacKenzie, of Halifax on a new drug "Quinidin" which corrects an irregular heart beat, and Dr. Duncan Graham of Toronto on "Pleural Infections."

CANNING STORE DESTROYED BY FIRE

CANNING, N. S., June 18.—The dry goods and gents' furnishing store owned by Jacobson Brothers was completely destroyed by fire which was discovered at one o'clock this morning. Splendid work on the part of the Fire Department, aided by a heavy rain and the absence of wind, saved several buildings in the vicinity. The origin of the fire is not known. When discovered the building was ablaze. Very little insurance was carried and the firm will suffer a heavy loss, both on the property which they purchased two years ago, and on their stock.
