During the campaign to Palestine, the sick and wounded were sometimes sent down the line on camels. The following is from a description of such a journey given by a correspondent:

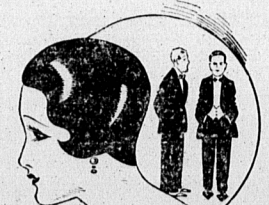

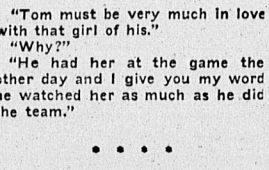

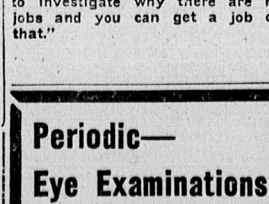
