ROLLED OATS AND OATMEAL TRADE IN NORTH OF ENGLAND

While Canadian rolled oats and oatmeal under normal conditions are exported in considerable quantities to the North of England market, during the past two or three years German oat products have been sold at such low prices that both Canadian and American exporters have found this market unprofitable.

A SUPERB CEREAL DECATUR, Mich., Jan. 5.—The early crop here is estimated to be 20 percent better than last year's despite the drought. Dry weather seems to have aided the plants, growers say, for roots are deeper and plants more stubby.

Market Reports

Call money 1 1/2 per cent. MONTRÉAL. The latter month being almost 2,000,000 k.w.h. compared with 11,946,000 k.w.h. for the same month of 1929. The output of Winnipeg Electric and Manitoba Power during November, the combined total comparing as 4,735,700 k.w.h. with 4,657,400 for the month of October. In British Columbia, East Kootenay showed a slight increase in output of 6,299,800 for October, B. C. Power and Northern British Columbia Power showed total output slightly down from October. On the whole, the group of seven power producers that are associated with Power Corporation of Canada showed an increase of over 800,000 k.w.h. for November compared with October. The total being 14,628,477 against 14,350,106 for October, and 136,699,219 for September. November figures show a new high output of this group for any month in 1930.

CANADIAN PACIFIC

After an unbroken series of decreases in gross earnings over the corresponding months of 1929, to the end of November, 1930, the Canadian Pacific Railway Co. broke away from this position for the first month of December. Gross earnings in net in November and also in August and September, 4 months out of the 12, a creditable showing under the difficult operating conditions and sharp declines in most cases in gross earnings against 1929. The total gross earnings for 1930 will be in the neighborhood of \$181,000,000, allowing for capital income, which will show a decrease from 1929 of \$12,000,000. The last few days of December added \$266,000 to the company's gain over 1929.

MARKET REVIEW FOR JANUARY 6, 1931

CANADA NORTHERN POWER. Canada Northern Power Corp. which supplies power to the two chief producing districts in Canada, the Fort Nelson and Kirtland, also showed a new high record of production and consumption of power during the month of December amounting to 2,245,500 k.w.h. This compared with 31,823,623 for the month of October, and 20,612,300 k.w.h. for September, an increase of 100 per cent. over the earlier months of the year. With several of these gold mining units increasing their capacity for this year, it seems probable that Canada Northern will continue to show increasing output month by month for some time to come.

IN MEMORIAM

Word was received in the city early yesterday morning of the death of Ernest Kelly, son of the late Conductor Frank Kelly and Mrs. Kelly. Although the deceased had not enjoyed good health for several months and was recently discharged from the hospital, a letter received by relatives here at Christmas stated he was improving. The telegram yesterday was as a consequence a great shock to relatives and friends. The late Ernest Kelly will be kindly remembered by a host of friends here, especially by the members of the 2nd Sarge Battery with whom he served overseas. At the conclusion of the war he returned to this city where he remained for a year, when he went to Boston and later to New York where he was employed as a private detective. No arrangements for the funeral have yet been announced.

MR. JOHN PRUNTY

The many friends of Mr. John Prunty, city, aged 75 years, will regret to learn of his death, which took place on Saturday, January 3rd.
