OUR FIREMEN.

The annual tournament of the Fire Departments of the Maritime Provinces is this year to be held in Charlottetown, on August 2 and 3. These competitions are of advantage in affording comparison as to alertness, skill and efficiency in all that pertains to the firemen's calling. Each brigade may learn something from another, and a wholesome and stimulating rivalry is begotten.

It is expected that the event will bring to our city a considerable number of competitors and visitors; that several of the visiting brigades will bring bands of music and the city will be quite en fete during the tournament. It is hoped that no pains will be spared to give the visitors a good time during their stay in the city, so that they will carry away with them pleasant impressions of their visit.

Our city like many other cities owes much to its firemen and their work, when duty calls, is arduous. They must be ready to respond with promptness to the fire alarm at any hour of the day or night, in all seasons of the year and in all kinds of weather. In snow-storms or rain or sleet, piercing cold or summer's heat they may be summoned for strenuous work, sometimes protracted for hours, to return later to their homes begrimed with smoke and with clothing saturated, perhaps ruined.

The Fire Department stands between our citizens and their greatest peril. It saves many thousands of dollars yearly, and not infrequently prevents an incipient blaze from becoming a sweeping conflagration. Its pay is all too little for the service rendered. It is therefore the less we can do to give expression to our appreciation of the good service rendered in the past, and the present efficiency of the Brigade under Chief Bonahan and the capable officers and men under his command. We believe this hearty appreciation is the common sentiment of our citizens.

The Catholic High School of Montreal has for years pursued the excellent practice of giving an annual prize to the pupil whose conduct has been most gentlemanly throughout the term. The recipient of the prize is elected by his fellow students and the prize this year was voted to a young French Canadian, Master de Bellefeuille by his associates, three-fourths of whom are English. This was of itself a proof of good feeling and broad-mindedness, and no doubt the high honor was well bestowed. There is a hint in this for our own colleges and schools.

Monday next being a public holiday no issue of The Guardian will appear on the morning of that day.

A special census is being taken this week in Alberta and Saskatchewan, midway of the usual census decade for Canada. This is because of the rapid influx of settlers in recent years. It is expected that Saskatchewan will be found to have a larger population than Manitoba.

Hon. J. V. Ellis has spoken on Senate reform. He favors the elective system, and would reduce the membership about one half but would generously allow Prince Edward Island to retain four Senators. He also stated his opinion that Canada is rapidly moving in the direction of national independence.

President Roosevelt proposes that all coal beds, petroleum fields, mineral and forest lands yet remaining in the possession of the national government shall not be sold, but only leased on clearly defined terms to persons or companies who shall work them under government supervision. This seems an excellent proposal.

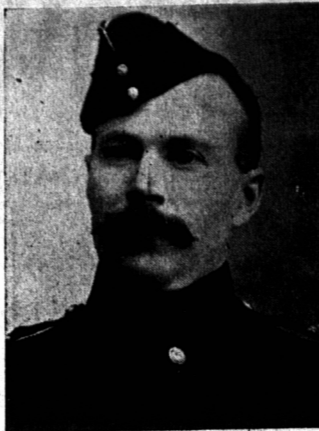

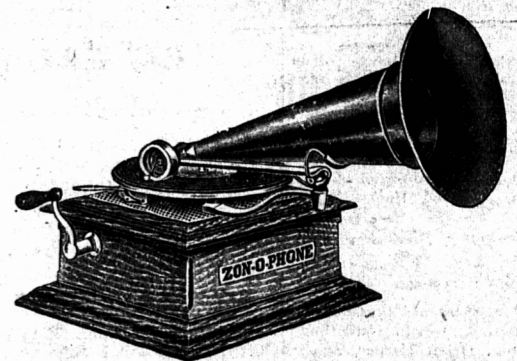

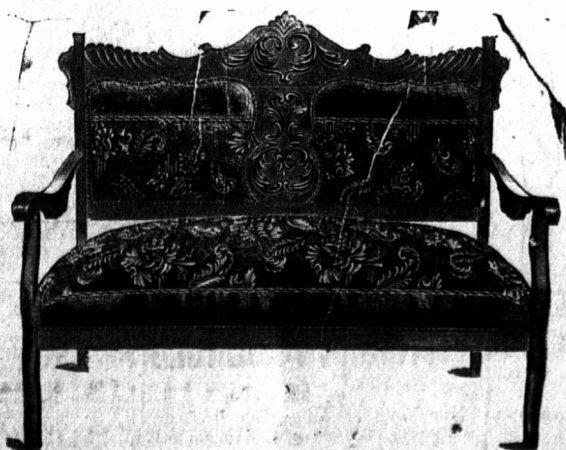
