MAINE TRIO ARRESTED FOR MURDER OF MAN THREE YEARS AGO

BIDDEFORD, Maine, June 23.—On the strength of information given to the York county authorities in support of an allegation that Charles Weymouth, a Saco butcher, was murdered, the sheriff today arrested Joseph Suzzell, of Gayton; Olney Merrill, of Gardiner, and Mrs. Maude Snow, of Dayton.

All three were taken to Alfred, the two men to answer the charge of murder, and the woman to a charge of having been an accessory to the alleged crime. The authorities state that their information had been obtained from two persons whose names they withheld and who claimed to have seen Weymouth beaten to death at Mrs. Snow's home.

Weymouth was 31 years old and a nephew of Dr. Harry A. Weymouth, former mayor of Saco. The two persons who told the story which caused the arrests informed the county authorities that Weymouth was infatuated with Mrs. Snow, who is the wife of Dr. Fred B. Snow.

He will speak also at North Milton on Wednesday July 5th, and at Cornwall on Thursday, July 6th. Supt. Robertson is well known in P. E. Island and his meetings should be very well attended.

The annual meeting of school district No. 131 was after due notice held in Orwell Cove School on Tuesday, June 20th, at 4 p. m. Joseph Morrisey acted as secretary. L. R. Ings retired and D. J. Many special features of great interest to the boys are being arranged. The different railroads and the steamboat lines have agreed to give reduced rates. The Island boys will leave here on July 11th in charge of Secretary Reily of the Y. M. C. A. and will go to Pictou on the Northumberland and will then scout from there into camp. Any boy in the Province over 12 years of age may go. It is not necessary that he belong to the Y. M. C. A. if the camp is conducted by that organization. All a boy needs is to have his application signed by his pastor and send it in.

Yesterday at noon, the Mitchell lots, on Lower Spring Park Road, were sold by public auction to Benj. Shepperd, city, for \$365.00. B. Carter & Co. were the auctioneers.

S. M. S. (His Majesty's Ship) Bremen, dropped anchor in Charlottetown harbor yesterday morning at nine o'clock, off the Marine Wharf, and after coming to her moorings, fired a salute of twenty-one guns in honor of the English flag. The Bremen is a German protected cruiser built in 1902 at Bremen. She is a ship of 3250 tons and is about 333 feet long. Her greatest width is 40 feet, her draught fore and aft 15 feet. She has 10 water tube boilers and two engines each 6000 horse power which develop a speed of 25 knots. She carries 10 centimetre (About 4 inch) guns and 4 maxims rifles, also one 6 centimetre gun for landing. Two of the guns are in the fore-castle, two on the quarter deck and two on the middle deck. She has 300 men all told, including 120 cooks. The Bremen left Halifax on Saturday night. She was in there for Coronation day and was illuminated on that occasion. Before coming to Charlottetown she had been down south and was in Newport News for three weeks for repairs. Before that she had been in Baltimore, where she took on board a new crew. She has been also cruising on the west coast of Central America, also the west and east coasts of South America, calling at Callao, Rio Janeiro, Pernambuco and other ports. She was in Canada three years ago, but at that time had an entirely different crew, the rules of the German navy requiring that the men serve two years only. The cruiser's hull is painted white and her upper works, including her three funnels, yellow, so that she has the appearance of a big pleasure yacht, although the formidable ram at her bow shows that she is built for fighting rather than pleasure. She has wireless telegraphy apparatus, the system being a special one used in the German navy. She carries two searchlights, steam launch, motor launch and seven other boats. In the forenoon His Worship Mayor Rogers and some of the City Councillors visited the ship. She will remain in this neighborhood for ten days, leaving port this evening. She expects to return again on Saturday. Visitors are received on board each day from 11.30 to 2 p. m.
