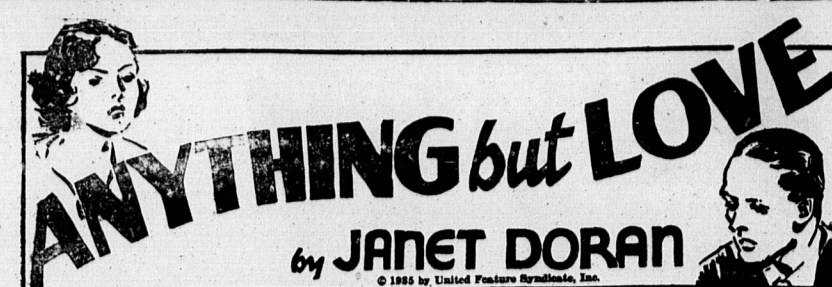

## New Outbreak Of Strikes In France

PARIS, Nov. 5.—A fresh outbreak of strikes added to the worries of Premier Blum tonight as parliament reopened in a session marked by a sharp clash between Rightists and Communists.

The Premier, Socialist deputies said, told them he planned to submit a bill calling for obligatory arbitration of strikes if circumstances make it necessary.

Three thousand employees occupied the Renault-Leva sor automobile plant while walkouts spread to several sections of the country.

Rightist deputies asserted outside Parliament they would interpellate the Government on its failure to end the occupation strikes, which began when the Popular Front Government took office last June.
