Summerside has made its usual contribution to the 1948 Musical Festival held in the Prince of Wales College auditorium this past week and was well represented by music loving people. Three local service clubs, Y's Men's, Rotary and Kinsmen, provided two buses on Thursday for the transportation of the pupils, as well as supplementing with private cars; and members of the Home and School Welfare Group, Catholic Women's League and Abegweit Chapter, I. O. D. E., supplied automobiles and were responsible for the care of the young artists while in the city. Mrs. Creelman MacArthur and Mr. L. W. Hancock, members of the Musical Festival, and Mrs. Alison MacLean of the Home and School Welfare Group extend thanks to the leading citizens and organizations who awarded 423 scholarships, namely, Mr. M. L. Bradshaw, Mr. Harold Gaudet, Abegweit Chapter, I.O.D.E., C.W.L. and Smallman's Ltd.; also to those who co-operated in any way. The adjudicator, Mr. David Ouchterlony of the Conservatory of Music in Toronto, commended many of the Summerside participants for their achievements, and his constructive criticism should be of much value in future efforts. The following awards were presented to the pupils: A scholarship was presented to Margaret Shaw who was the highest in a class of forty-eight for singing "Berceuse" a girl's solo for 18 years and under. She was given the highest commendation possible to an individual performer. A scholarship was also presented to Margaret Joan Muttart for singing "A Swan", a girl's solo for 18 years and under. Sara Jane Estey won third honours and Barry Bullis tied for third in vocal solos; Sara Jane Estey and Ruth Cannon won third place in a vocal duet; Janet Horne and June Geddis were awarded second honours in piano solos; Sara Jane Estey, Margaret Shaw and Carol MacLean won third places with their piano solos; Margaret and Mary Shaw came third in a piano duet. In the public school chorus (grades 3 and 4) "Margery Maketh The Tea", Summerside was awarded 1st place; Chorus (grades 1 and 2) 2nd place; Chorus (5 and 6, 7 and 8, 9 and 10) each won third place and a three part chorus (grades 9 and 10) took second place.

Much credit is due Miss E. Nelle Morrison, teacher of music in Summerside High School for the favorable showing made by her pupils.—S.

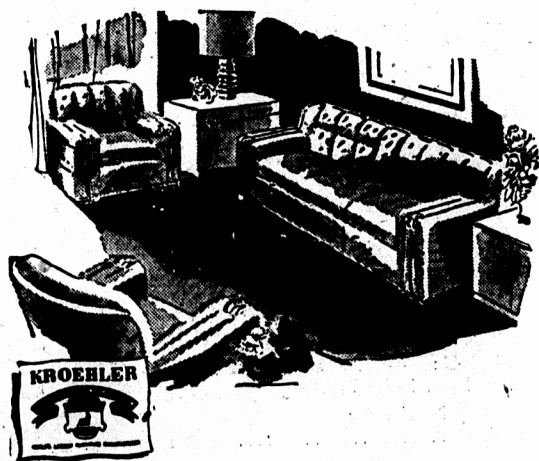

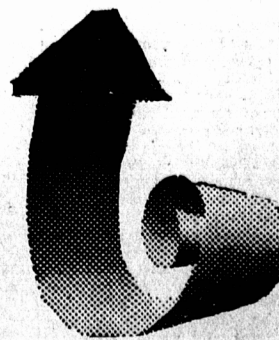

In Memoriam

Her many friends in Tryon and in many other districts throughout the Island were saddened and shocked to hear of the sudden death of Mrs. Artonas Lord at her home on April 15th, 1948, after a few hours illness. She was formerly Christie Ann Thomas, daughter of the late William Thomas and Flora MacKinnon Thomas. She was born at North Tryon, Sept. 18th, 1886 and had lived all her life in this community where she was well and favorably known. For the past number of years she had been crippled afflicted with paralysis in her leg and hip, and has been in her chair, but in spite of this she was uncomplaining and seemed to enjoy life in spite of her disabilities and she always was cheerful and had a smile of welcome for the many friends who called at her home. She was a faithful member of the United Church for many years. She was predeceased by her husband nineteen years ago last December.

She leaves to mourn one son George in Montreal, and one daughter Adelaide, Mrs. Harold Heggner, Abbotsford, B.C. and three grandchildren, her mother, Mrs. Flora Thomas, and six sisters, Etelle Thomas, Clara, Mrs. Everett Howard; Mrs. Martha Crossman, Tryon; Norine, Mrs. Burpee C&T, St. John, N.B.; Mrs. Eliza Hennessy and Emma Thomas, Charlottetown, besides a number of nephews and nieces.

The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon, April 18th. A short service at the residence was followed by a service at 2:30 in Tryon United Church conducted by the Rev. E.L. Woodside assisted by the Rev. C.A. Hicks of the Baptist Church. Favorite hymns of the deceased were sung—"The Lord is My Shepherd", "What a Friend we have in Jesus", "Nearer My God to Thee".

Many beautiful floral tributes testified to the high esteem in which she was held. Interment was in the family plot in the People's Cemetery, Tryon.
