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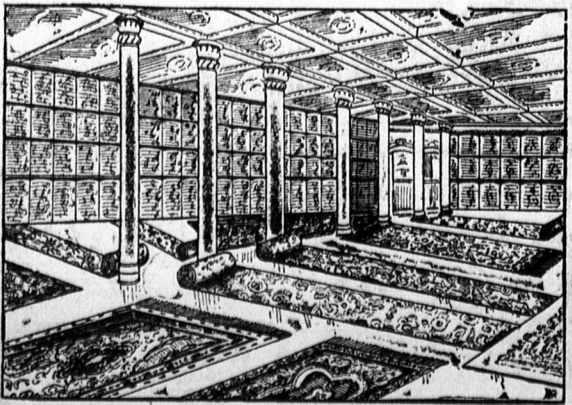

A RHAPSODY OF THE LINKS.

Over in St. John when the fog lifts, as it does occasionally, the people go out on the moist grass of the back pasture and play golf. At least they make the effort and that counts for something over there. The infection seems to have become quite wide spread, as even the newspaper men have become affected by it—something that has not yet happened here. We know not what might occur if the militant editors and reportorial warriors of Charlottetown should be turned loose in the same field just at present armed with ponderous clubs and before the excitement due to the high temperature and the ministerial visit has subsided. But this by the way.

We set out to tell that when the St. John newspaper man returns from the links he makes it a point to seem in no wise wearied with his pleasure exertion. This is something worthy of being imitated by the devotees of the Belvidere grounds whose return from the links sometimes suggests the third line in Gray's mellifluous Elegy. Many of the uninitiated are wont to wonder why our local drivers and putters appear to take their sport so seriously and with that tired feeling so much in evidence when the task is done. Evidently the St. John idea is a good one, however deceptive, not to appear altogether worn out when on the home stretch. It is in this mood and somewhat in "Erebus vein" as Bottom would say, that the editor of the St. John Telegraph on return from "the raging rocks and shivering shocks" of this arduous pastime proceeds to indite a rhapsody on what is dignified by the name of "the ancient and royal game." We quote an extract:

"And that brings us to the ancient and royal game of golf, the queen of games. Enthroned she sits, the presiding spirit of health and happiness and good-nature. In the sphere of her influence no rancor, malice, or uncharitableness can linger. There is such peace in the smile upon her sun-browned face, such grace in her lissome strength, such Greek beauty in her poses! Out in the open air she fears but little weather. She has no megrims. She knows no morbid 'blues.' All this and much more just to show that he was not tired. We commend the spirit of this extract and the spirit that prompted it, to those who "bear the burden and heat of the day" on the torrid slopes of Belvidere. If they cannot simulate so much enthusiasm, let them at least be as cheerful as the solemn occasion will permit.
