**That Car Of Yours**

Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers on How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.

**LATER CARS DIFFERENT**

Has the refinement of automobiles particularly the power plant, gained such momentum that the car buyer is left in the lurch? Many service experts answer the question affirmatively. One reason for their view relates to the pressure lubrication systems generally used on the latest automobiles. Many of these register a low pressure at idling speeds, far lower than the cruder systems of yesterday recorded on their less sensitive gauges. The motorist, noting the difference, thinks something is wrong with the oil pump. He asks that the pressure be set up—in some cases insists upon it—in spite of the fact that the practice results in quick carbonization from over-lubrication.

**IT DOES MEAN SOMETHING**

All this activity in the shock absorber field suggests to the thinking motorist that there's a meaning behind it. There is. It is, succinctly, that the modern shock absorber is an advanced product that the complete motorist should investigate quickly. But Farquhar, looking at it fitly in his car, too.

**FREES UP THE BRAKES**

On some cars, it just happens that the springs that pull the brake pedal back to normal are so rugged that pushing against them is a tiresome task. In such a case, it usually will be found that lighter springs can be installed at a small cost. This applies, of course, chiefly in the mechanical brake layout. It is an idea that the woman car owner particularly may well bear in mind.

**MIGHT STOP BOASTING**

Motorists whose fast speedometers lead them into reputations for boastfulness should know this story. A man buying an expensive car that was to be chauffeur-driven wanted an extra speedometer installed where he could see it to check up on the driver. Five hundred different speedometers were tested before two were found which registered exactly alike. They were good speedometers, too!

**ENTIRELY TOO SIMPLE**

Occasionally, in motordom, the remedy for a difficulty is entirely too simple to get consideration. An engineer who knows quite a bit about automobiles was driving through the rain. He soon noticed that his right trouser leg was getting wet but in the darkness could not discover where the water was coming from. Two hours later, he realized that the cow ventilator was open, providing a natural rain spout.

**NOISES IN THE BUMPER**

It is a mistake to think of bumper looseness only in terms of loose bolts at the brackets. The modern bumper has several features that are bolted together. Lighter ones are more prone to work loose. They should be checked first in case of noise.

**AVOID FALSE ECONOMY**

There are two ways of taking depreciation on an automobile—a little at a time or all at once. The man who takes it all at once is the one who allows inefficiencies in performance to accumulate to a point where the complete overhaul is necessary.
