ENTITLED TO THE TUNNEL.

On every ground the Maritime Provinces are entitled to railway connection with each other. The original union of 1907 was formed on a basis of railway construction, the Intercolonial, to bind them together. British Columbia was brought in on a basis of promised rail connection with Ontario. Both these compacts were at once pressed forward to completion by the construction of the Intercolonial and the Canadian Pacific Railways.

Prince Edward Island joined the union on a basis of promised "efficient and continuous steam communication with the Mainland winter and summer." That solemn treaty has not been carried out and no honest attempt has been made to carry it out. By reason of this failure and breach of faith the Island has suffered intolerable hardship and loss. New Brunswick and Nova Scotia have also suffered serious loss.

Now let us see what has been done in fulfillment of and over and above the stipulated terms of union among the Provinces of the Mainland. Cape Breton that was isolated when our Island went into the union, has been given rail connection with the mainland of Nova Scotia by the extension of the Intercolonial. Nova Scotia has been connected with New Brunswick by rail. She had no rail connection at the date of the union with any other Province.

New Brunswick that had at the union no outside railway connection, has been since joined to Quebec by the Intercolonial and by other lines all heavily subsidized by the Dominion Government, has a second connection with Quebec Province by the Temiscouata Railway and by the C. P. R. and Shore Lines, has four lines connecting across the international boundary with the state of Maine.

Quebec which at the union had only the Grand Trunk to connect her with Ontario and the States, now has ten rail way lines, all subsidized by the Dominion to connect her directly with the adjoining States, the Grand Trunk double-tracked to Toronto and no fewer than six other lines connecting her with Ontario.

Ontario, besides her added connections with Quebec, has seven or eight lines connecting her with the boundary with the States and two with Manitoba. The Prairie Provinces has also five railways connecting with the States and seven connecting with Saskatchewan. The latter is connected westward with Alberta by three railways and southward with the States by one.

Alberta is connected westward by two lines through the Rockies to British Columbia, and one southward to the States. British Columbia, in addition to her eastward railway connection, has six railways crossing the international boundary to the southward.

Here are fifty-six railway lines connecting Province with Province or Province with State across provincial or international boundaries, over fifty of which have been built since the union, and almost all either subsidized or built outright by the Dominion. To all these is to be added the Transcontinental Railway, now under construction, by the Dominion to further connect seven of the Mainland Provinces together.

So much has been done by the Dominion to afford inter-provincial and international railway transportation, not stipulated except in small part by any terms of union, while the compact with Prince Edward Island has remained practically a dead letter. In view of these facts will any man say we are not entitled to the Tunnel?

TAXES MUST BE PAID.

As many of our readers are aware, an act was passed at the last session of the Legislature providing a more simple method of collecting arrears of land, road and income taxes, as well as all other taxes due the Government. The old act

provided that for land tax arrears the lands in arrears be proceeded against, and this necessitated advertising both before and after obtaining judgment. The delay was tedious and the expenses often excessive when compared with the amounts due.

The new act will obviate this difficulty as it gives the Government power to sue in any court and to levy on the goods and chattels found on the premises or in possession of the party sued, whether he be the owner, tenant, or occupier of the land in arrears. In default of goods and chattels the land may be proceeded against under the old act as heretofore. Taxes of every kind are crown debts and have priority over all other claims, judgments, mortgages or bills of sale. And taxes must be paid.

It is the duty of the Government, and we understand by their advertisement in this issue that it is their intention to collect all arrears and all taxes as they become due. Taxes upon our farmers in this Province are fortunately for them, much less than in other Provinces of Canada and should be promptly paid. It is not just or businesslike that some should pay and others be permitted to delay payments from year to year. Let all pay up and so enable the Government to begin each year with a clean sheet.

"Great Britain, with forty two millions people, will spend this year seven hundred and fifty million dollars. Canada, with six million people, will spend one hundred and twenty-six million dollars." says The Patriot. But the fact is, that five hundred millions of the British expenditure was made up of the interest on the national debt, the cost of maintaining the army and navy and the sum of \$67,000,000 of the national debt paid off in one year. Canada is not paying off her debt and has no army or navy. And yet outside of these services named Britain's expenditure for 43 millions of people is only \$250,000,000.

The cause of numerous diseases and disagreeable habits, heretofore ascribed as constitutional, have been traced directly to the teeth. Blindness, drooping, frothing, loss of flesh, weak eyes, driving on one rein and pulling are very often due to diseased and irregular teeth. Rough edges and sharp corners of the teeth lacerate the mouth, and produce nervousness and irritability; uneven and elongated molars and incisors prevent the proper mastication of the food, producing indigestion and general debility. Decayed molars cause necrosis of the bone, abscesses, nasal gleet, etc. These causes should be removed. Decayed teeth should be removed by extracting or trephaning, sharp corners and rough edges should be smoothed down, and elongated and uneven molars and incisors cut off. The common root, or file heretofore deemed sufficient to accomplish this, will not suffice but special instruments devised for the purpose are necessary. 4-25drh
