Fluke Counter Gives Chicago Win Over Detroit; Rangers Defeat Americans

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) DETROIT, Dec. 25.—Detroit Red Wings handed the fast skating Chicago Black Hawks a Christmas present tonight in the form of a goal scored by a member of the Detroit club and the Hawks beat the Wings 2-1 in a fast, thrills-packed National Hockey League match before a roaring crowd of 10,000.

The goal which played a large part in a game in which the losers more than held their own, came in the opening period. Tommy Cook racing down the side, lost the puck to Wally K. ran up from the International League with the Wings for the first time in three years, trying to shoot the rubber into the Wing net past the astonished Tom Smith, and Cook was credited with the goal.

Some Chabot, Hawk goalie, cleared himself with glory for the rest of the game and particularly in the second period, when he turned back 11 hard shots as the Wings tried desperately to knot the count on repeated four and five man drives. In the third stanza, again trying to tie up the game, the Wings were caught flat-footed when Howie Morenz broke away clean, raced down and passed to Gotszell, took the puck on another pass and beat Smith cleanly. The Wing goal came in the final minute of play, Lewis scoring on a pass from Aurie, but it was too late when Howie Morenz broke drive to produce results against the Detroit Hawk defence.

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.—(A.P.)—The Rangers turned the tables on their New York city rivals, the Americans, with a 3-1 victory in the second of their National Hockey League battles tonight and evened the season's series at one victory apiece. A crowd of 15,000 saw the game.

Although the Amerks forced the pace all the way, they couldn't drive the puck past Davey Kerr the Ranger goalie, while the blue shirts seized their opportunities to score on pretty passing plays. Kerr turned in an exceptionally fine performance, stopping 43 shots while Rvy Worters of the Amerks had only 22 saves. The addition of Harold Starr, recently purchased from Montreal Maroons, improved Rangers' defensive work.

Rangers took the lead in the second period after each had scored in the first. Earl Seibert shot a long pass to Art Somers, who passed to Murray Murdoch after his dash toward the net had pulled Worters out of place. Murdoch netted a pretty shot. The extra counter came in the last minute of play when the Amerks were pressing to tie and Frank Boucher skated through the entire star spangled team to count.

The Canadiens, tied for second place with the highly rated Ottawa Senators in the Montreal Senior League, suffered a defeat at the hands of the Hawks who despite the loss of three of their last year stars, but bolstered by several newcomers, proved they were still the potent hockey machine when two successive Dominion championship titles, the Abegweits, noted in the Maritime "Big Four" for their wide open style of play and dazzling speed, should revel in the visitors' style of play and action should cram every minute of the game. The match, an exhibition affair, will give fans some criterion of the brand of hockey dished out in Upper Canada this year.

TRICOLOR PROVIDED 1934 SPORT THRILL

(By Eimer Dulmage) (Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, Dec. 25.—The gallant rush of Ted Reeves' "lost battalion" from Queens, a unit shattered by fraternity rules and shaken by injuries that led to a last-minute triumph in the intercollegiate football union play-off on Nov. 17 topped 1934's sport battles in point of thrills.

Sport editors who reviewed the year's hair-raising and placed their ballots in a poll conducted by The Canadian Press got their biggest kick out of the gridiron gameness of the tricolor, not only in beating University of Toronto 8-7 in a sudden-death playoff here but in staying near the top at all.

The Tricolor was behind 7-6 starting the period and three minutes from the end the score was unchanged. But the Reevesmen had plunged to within striking distance. Freshman Johnny Munro, former Toronto Argonaut junior, punted for a single that tied the count.

A minute later Munro stood in position to boot the winning point. He kicked high behind the Toronto goal line to Bobby Coulter, fleet blue quarterback. Queen's tacklers burst through and nailed Coulter for a rouge.

The National Hockey League final between Detroit Red Wings and Toronto Maple Leafs, which the Wings won by 1-0, ranked second in the thrill poll. This was the fifth and deciding game of the unusual series in which the Wings won the first two games on Toronto ice and the Leafs went into Detroit and captured the next two.

Prominently mentioned among the year's more thrilling episodes was the Montreal Hawks-Hamilton Tigers Allan Cup hockey semifinal, in which the Tigers staged a grand rally in the second game to bang in two second period goals and tied the series, then succumbed to Maritime power in a dazzling third period. Montreal won the two-game series 3-2.

BASEBALL DEALS ON

Falling to do much business at the New York meeting, the managers are scurrying around trying to plug up weak spots before hitting south for Spring training.

Cincinnati Reds started the anticipated flurry by paying St. Louis Cardinals \$55,000 for Johnny Mize, a first sacker who labored last season as one of the Cardinals' farm hands at Rochester, N. Y.

Charlie Grimm, with the Wrigley millions behind him, is looking for at least one high grade starting pitcher for Chicago Cubs. The sky is the limit if he can land the man he wants.

Harold "Pie" Traynor, Manager of Pittsburgh Pirates, also needs relief pitching, particularly behind the plate. The Pirates want Al Todd, young Philly catcher, and may land him if they can buy or trade for a right-handed hitting outfielder. The Phillies want Lloyd Waner or Earl Grace, another catcher, for Todd. Traynor can't make this deal until he replaces Waner.

Hal Lee of Boston Braves would suit Pittsburgh, but Bill McKechnie isn't interested in cash. He has only about 23 players on his roster and it he is to part with any of his first stringers he wants talent, not cash, in return.

In the American League there is plenty of activity via mail and telegraph.

LEAFS SWAMP CANADIENS 6-2

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONCTON, Que., Dec. 25.—Toronto Maple Leafs rammed a 6-2 defeat down Montreal Canadiens' Christmas stockings here tonight and gave a holiday crowd a smart demonstration of why they are the leading team in the National Hockey League today.

Leafs scored in the first period, split a pair of goals in the second with the Flying Frenchmen, and then banged in four goals in the final 20 minutes while Canadiens scored one.

Bill Thoms scored first, Hec Kiltrea and Buzz Boll assisting. George Mantha evened it up for Canadiens in the second on a double pass from Pete Lepine and Wildor Laroche. Charlie Conacher scored the next on a pass from Joe Primeau. Early in the third the Leafs struck again. Buzz Boll slamming in a goal on a play with Hec Kiltrea. Leroy Goldsworthy put Canadiens closer with a goal from just outside the crease. Lepine and George Mantha got assists. Pep Kelly and Andy Blair fed Harold Cotton, passes for another Leaf goal. Harvey Jackson was next to score. Conacher and Primeau figuring in the assists. The final goal was a smart effort by Pep Kelly who scooped up a pass from Headline Hollett and banged it past Will Cude.

Art Jackson To Join Minor League Club

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Dec. 25.—Art Jackson, Toronto Maple Leaf recruit and a brother of Harvey Jackson of the same team, will join Syracuse Stars of the International League for further seasoning, it was learned today.

Jackson, who played for the amateur junior hockey champions of last season, St. Michael's College of Toronto, will play for the Stars against London Thursday. He will be brought back later in the season and it is likely Nick Metz will then report to the Stars.

JACKSON HEADS N.H.L. SCORERS

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Dec. 25.—Despite a slump in scoring by the Toronto Maple Leafs, Harvey Jackson, left winger of the "kid line," retained his position at the head of the National Hockey League scoring during the past week. Jackson could only add a single goal to his total to top his average to 16 goals and six assists, 22 points, but his nearest rival, Charlie Conacher, another Leaf, was unable to figure in the scoring and remained in second place with nine goals, 10 assists, 19 points.

Conroy Weiland, a centre for Detroit Red Wings, put on a spurt to bound past his team-mate, Ebbie Goodfellow, into the leadership of the American section and third position in the whole league. Weiland chalked up two goals and one assist to raise his total to 18 points. Goodfellow, who leads all defencemen in scoring, added an assist and fell into a tie for second place in the American section with Herbie Lewis and Larry Aurie, his mates.

Tied with Goodfellow, Aurie and Lewis in fourth place in the whole league was Earl Robinson, the Maroons' leading scorer. Robinson added a goal to boost his total to 15 points, made up of 10 goals and 5 assists. Robinson is second only to Jackson in goals scored.

Red Horner, Toronto, continued as the league "bad man" with 43 minutes in penalties. Scotty Bowman, St. Louis, had 31 minutes and Art Coulter, big Chicago defenceman, 30.
