After a spirited discussion a committee of five was appointed to secure data necessary to start an electric light plant as the information presented at the meeting was not sufficient in detail.

DURING the past week there has been very little change in the produce market. The price of oats has not changed, 36 cents being paid. Buyers state that the time has not yet arrived for the potato market. At least very small quantities are offering and 21 and 23 cents were the prevailing prices. Hay is in good demand and \$10 per ton for pressed is paid.

The crew were saved. The vessel was insured in Lloyds, she was 48 tons and owned by Capt. Bonnell and John McDonald, Murray River.
