(Canadian Press) HALIFAX N. S., Aug. 31.-About 6000 people saw a great free-for-all race at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition meet today. Tarzan Grattan, 2:02 3-4, owned by Walter M. Reid, Fort Fairfield, Maine, and driven by Monte Gerow, won in straight heats with Red Line, 2:09 1-2, Harry Putnam, 2:06 3-4 and Lambert Todd, 2:02 1-2 making such a race with him that the record of 2:11 3-4 made by Terrace Queen, 2:06, twenty years ago, was broken in every heat. The first heat was in 2:10 3-4 while the second was in 2:08 3-4 which lowered the track record of 2:09 1-4 made by Lambert Todd in an exhibition against time a year ago.

Major Aubrey was too fast for his field in the 2:28 class, winning in 2:13 and Briar Mac won the named race. Both of these horses are owned in Prince Edward Island. This closed a successful five days meet, with good racing, fast time track records broken and not one complaint about the judging. Nine-teen heats were trotted throughout the meet with an average of 2:15 3-4 and 28 heats paced with an average of 2:14.

He is taking the west to east route by way of Gibraltar and the Mediterranean. The sturdy carries a small engine which Miles will use in getting in and out of harbor.

POTATO BUYERS FROM CUBA TO MEET GROWERS

MONCTON, Aug. 31.-Potato producers in this part of the province have been advised that Renato Canizares, the new Cuban Consul for the Maritime Provinces with headquarters at Saint John, has received word that a party of potato buyers of Havana and other centres of the Island Republic are coming to Saint John for conference with the New Brunswick producers. Such an expedition was made last summer and was productive of good results. One representative of a large potato brokerage concern, Henry A. Damers, is at present in New York, on his way to Saint John from Cuba.

It is expected that New Brunswick has the island of Cuba through the Saint John port during the coming fall and winter will far exceed the business done last season. The first vessel to leave is expected to leave Saint John for Havana on about September 15, more than three weeks in advance of last year, when the first steamer cleared from Saint John harbour on October 8. With the signing of the trade treaty now being negotiated, the council thinks the opportunities will be greatly enhanced. Last season the total of potatoes shipped through the H. E. port was approximately \$1,307,787 and from the present outlook it is quite likely that the \$2,000,000 mark might be reached this year.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 31.-The export trade in Canadian grain here today was practically at a standstill, which exporters attributed to the fact that the pool were underselling them by 2-1/2 to 3c per bushel. There was an increased inquiry from New York exporters for berth for ocean room here to the continent. Reported that the surplus supply on spot on Antwerp and Rotterdam was pretty well cleaned up at bargain rates. There was no change in car lot prices for cash grain in the local market. The demand was better for domestic and receipts were 13,808 boxes.

Opportunities for good markets for the New Brunswick hay, cured fish and sardines, as well as other commodities which had been traded previously, look well, said the new Consul, especially if the trade treaty becomes effective this fall.

country account and a moderate amount of business was done. The trade in spring and winter wheat grades of flour was fair and values were steady. A stronger feeling developed in the market for standard grades of rolled oats and values were marked up fifteen cents per bag. The demand for all lines of millfeed continued good and prices were unchanged. A feature of the egg trade was the further strength that prevailed in the market and bidding prices for all grades were marked up another cent per dozen. This was attributed to the steady increasing demand and the limited supplies. The receipts were 1,187 cases. The market for imported beans was without any new feature to note, prices being firm on account of the continued small offerings. Prices for all grades of butter were well maintained under a fair demand. The receipts were 1,000 packages. Extreme dullness again marked the local export trade in cheese. The de-bur prices were unchanged. The receipts were 13,808 boxes.
