Magnificent Reception To Conservative Candidates At Hope River Last Evening

Canadian National Railways, and the distribution of over \$20,000,000 to the laboring classes. His explanation of this matter, and his passing reference to the Andrew Fraser Michel-McLure fiasco, were received with loud and prolonged applause.

Another misstatement of Liberal opponents was noted by Mr. McLure on the subject of old age pensions. He pointed out that but for the old age pensions legislation passed as a result of the Bennett Government contributing 75 per cent, this Province's relief bill would be \$40,000 greater than it is.

"We have been charged with not having done anything to implement the Duncan Commission report," he continued. "That is an astonishing complaint because Mr. Mackenzie King in 1930 boasted that he had implemented the Commission's recommendations 100 per cent in letter and spirit." Far from this being the case Mr. McLure showed that it was left for the Bennett Government to implement many of the Commission's findings, including the change in the car ferry accounting system, reduced auto rates on the car ferry and an annual provincial subsidy increase of \$150,000.

Dealing with the County's transportation problem he referred to the success achieved in obtaining the Rustico-Hunter River highway. Other projects urged upon the Ottawa administration were paved highways between Crapaud and Victoria; Stanley Bridge, New London and Sea View; and Mt. Stewart, Bedford and Tracadie. In view of the fact that Rustico had no transportation facilities Mr. Myers had agreed to support Mr. McLure in first urging the claim of that section, and in return he was assured of Mr. McLure's support of the Crapaud-Victoria project.

Mr. McLure read the terms of the federal agreement which provided that there must be no political, racial or religious discrimination. Only a few days ago he had received a notification from the Deputy Minister of Labour at Ottawa enclosing a complaint that this requirement had been violated.

Mr. McLure concluded by stressing the benefits of the Empire Trade Agreements and the vital necessity of retaining the Bennett administration in power.

MR. MYERS

Mr. Myers' clear-cut presentation of the tariff barriers facing Canadian farm producers when the Bennett Government took office in 1930 made an obviously strong impression on the audience, as did also his explanation of the great advantages of the Empire Trade Agreements and the trade situation under both parties existing between Canada and the United States. At

the present time, he showed, "there is every expectation that a satisfactory trade agreement will be negotiated between the Bennett Government and President Roosevelt's administration."

The persistent opposition offered by Mr. King and his colleagues (with one exception) to the Empire Trade Agreements was emphasized.

"Who?" asked Mr. Myers at the close of his remarks on this point, "who are the electors going to entrust with renewing these agreements next year. Is it Premier Bennett, the man who negotiated them and was responsible for the great trade agreements which met at Ottawa in 1932, or is it Mr. King, who held them up for two months in Parliament and has opposed them ever since. Which candidates do you believe in supporting in this issue?"

(Applause.)
"Myers and McLure!" (Applause.)

Mr. Myers: "If we are returned you may depend upon it we will support those agreements to the hilt." (Increased Applause.)

Mr. Myers then dealt with the great trade agreements with Brazil, Germany, France, Austria, Haiti, Guatemala, Bolivia, Costa Rica, Panama and Poland.

A strong point was made by Mr. Myers when he pointed out that in addition to the Empire Trade Agreements the Bennett Government has negotiated trade agreements with Brazil, Germany, France, Austria, Haiti, Guatemala, Bolivia, Costa Rica, Panama and Poland.

Cuba Excluded
"Why were not the privileges of the West India agreement extended to Cuba by Mr. King in 1926?" Mr. Myers demanded. "I see no reason why it should not have been done. At the time we had three Liberal representatives from this Province in the House of Commons. Why did they not point out to Mr. King that our potato trade with Cuba was important and that Cuba should be included in the terms of that agreement? If they did raise any protest it went unheeded by their leader."

"That agreement comes up for renewal again in 1936 and you may depend that the Bennett Government will see to it that Cuba is not ignored as it was ten years ago under the King Government." (Applause.)

Dealing with Liberal "blank cheque" charges against the Bennett Government, Mr. Myers again drew loud applause when he declared drily: "The blank cheque season of the Legislature which we had a few weeks ago should supply all the example of dictatorial government that we want in this province."

The speaker also dealt briefly with the record of Hon. Mr. Stevens and the Prime Minister's Commission. "Work done in 1924 amounted to \$66,000,000,000 and by 1933 had

clipped to \$23,000,000,000—a fact which Mr. Stevens had not explained, but which materially affected his monetary criticisms. Mr. Myers showed that Stevens also failed to tell us that in the past five years not one single bank closed its doors; not one single insurance company failed to honour its policies—thanks to the sound statesmanship of the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett." (Applause.)

Mr. Myers also dealt briefly with railway problems affecting the Province, stressing particularly our right to have the railway shops open here as well as in Moncton.

"If we are returned after the election we mean to make a fight over this matter at Ottawa and see if we cannot maintain our provincial integrity," he declared amid applause.

Mr. Myers also discussed the federal housing scheme which may be taken advantage of by any city by arrangement with the Department of Labor. He approved of this measure and believed it would be a benefit to many people otherwise unable to build their own homes, and also as a means of stimulating industry and employment.

Another point made by Mr. Myers was that our influx of population has more than equalled our industrial development, which accounts for the fact that we still have unemployment. This problem is being solved by the Bennett Government, as it has done with other problems during the depression.

His closing appeal was warmly applauded.

A hearty vote of thanks moved by Mr. McLure and seconded by Mr. Myers was tendered the chairman.

Applause also greeted Mr. Patrick Doyle, who, at the close of the meeting enthusiastically commended Premier Bennett, the Conservative candidates and ex-Premier MacMillan for obtaining so much for this Province during the past four years.

hard words for the League and its policy.

"Two weights and two measures," said Virginio Gayda, friend of Mussolini and authoritative writer, in an article in the Giornale d'Italia. Gayda said it took the League 17 months "to do nothing about Japan," but only a month to get ready to "stop Italy."

The government, while proud of the first conquering advance, regards the job as only begun.

Two Aspects to Problem

There are two aspects to the problem, said Gayda. The first one, of Italy-Ethiopia relations, "will be solved with arms." The matter of control in that kingdom can be discussed "with the two interested powers, France and Britain," he said, under the treaty of 1906 in which Italy's predominance in Ethiopia was recognized.

"While Italy is fighting in Africa," said Di Lavoura Fascista, "the League tries to strike her in the back."

Diplomatic relations between Italy and Ethiopia are about to be broken off officially. Luigi Vinciguerra, Minister to Ethiopia, has been authorized to leave Addis Ababa.

Negradas Yesus, Ethiopian Charge d'Affaires here, has been ordered to return.

Yesus, a government spokesman asserted, would receive his passports tomorrow. He said it was significant that Ethiopia both had requested the Charge d'Affaires' passports and had asked Vinciguerra to leave Addis Ababa.

This, the spokesman contended, clearly indicated Ethiopia wanted to sever relations with Italy. This severance, he believed, would not cause Italy to declare that her operations in Ethiopia constitute a state of war.
