Leafs Rout Americans In Scoring Rampage

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—(A.P.)—The Toronto Maple Leafs, fast-stepping leaders of the National Hockey League's Canadian Division, outdid all of their previous scoring efforts this season by walloping the last-place New York Americans 9 to 1. It was the highest score by any team of the season, going one above Toronto's 8-3 mark against the Montreal Maroons, and the six goals in the third period set a mark for a single season.

The triumph increased Toronto's lead over the Montreal Canadiens to five points. The Americans were outclassed in everything but gameness and it was their determined effort to score in the final frame that enabled the Leafs to run up so big a score.

Third Period Rush Beats Canadiens

BOSTON, Dec. 5.—(A.P.)—Outplayed, but not out-scored, for two periods, the Boston Bruins put on a wild rush in the third session tonight to turn back Les Canadiens by a 5-2 margin.

The game was deadlocked at 2-2 after 50 minutes of fast and exciting hockey, and Alex Smith turned the tide for the Bruins by caging a long drive from a few feet inside of the Frenchmen's blue line. The tally upset the visitors and before the game ended, Joe Lamb and Harry Oliver gave the Bruins their fourth and fifth tallies.

"Red" Beattie opened the scoring early in the initial session by feinting Les Canadiens' defense out of position and, about six minutes later, Howie Morenz tied the score with the assistance of Johnny Gagnon. The tally was Morenz' first of the season. In his 10 previous games he was only able to contribute one assist to the Flying Frenchmen's cause.

In the second Marty Barry put the Bruins back in front after Eddie Shore started a power play by firing from mid-ice. The puck hit the wire in back of Lorne Chabot's cage and Barry came in so fast that he was able to score on the bounce. Wildor Larochelle's unassisted tally enabled Les Canadiens to leave the ice even for the second time in the game, which drew a crowd of 10,000.

Big 4 Clubs To Have A Variety Of Options In Selecting Arbiters

Meeting At Amherst Yesterday Fails To Reach Definite Decision.

AMHERST, N. S., Dec. 5.—Unless other arrangements are urged between now and commencement of the playdowns, clubs in the Maritime Hockey League will have a variety of options for refereeing games. The question was discussed at a meeting of team representatives here today but they failed to reach any definite decision and clubs were left pretty much to their own discretion.

As agreed today teams will be permitted to continue with the economic style of one referee; use two home officials or have an outside arbiter as his referee-in-chief with a home-town official assistant; if the two clubs concerned are in accord they can arrange a single out-of-town referee; if the visiting club demands a neutral official the home club will pay regular referee fee and the visitors will stand travelling expenses at the rate of 15 cents for each of the first 50 miles and 10 cents for each additional mile, one way only.

BRAVES SET NEW FIELDING RECORD

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—(A.P.)—A new club fielding record for the Boston Braves and individual marks by Billy Herman, Chicago Cubs' second baseman, and Jimmy Wilson, St. Louis backstop recently traded to the Phillies, featured the National League's defensive performances for 1933, according to the official averages just released.

The Braves added two percentage points to their own previous league record, made in 1932 by finishing with a fielding mark of .978. The Cardinals, Giants, Cubs and Pirates all were bunched, in that order, separated altogether only a half-point in the percentage column.

Hughie Critz, of the Giants beat out Frankie Frisch, manager of the Cardinals, for second base fielding leadership by the thinnest kind of a margin—98167 to 98166—but Herman took the record-breaking honors for keystone workers.

The Cub star, with 466 putouts, broke the National League mark that has stood since 1912, when Bill Sweeney of Boston collected 469 putouts. Herman also established a league record with 11 putouts in one game.

Wilson, with 18 putouts behind the bat on July 30 against the Cubs, surpassed the record of 17 set by John Deberry of Brooklyn in 1928. This was the game in which Dixie Dean whiffed 17 Cubs for a new Major League strikeout record.
