SUNDAY SAILING.

The Lord's Day Alliance at its recent meeting in this city recorded, its protest against a certain steamer having fixed Sunday as the advertised date of its sailing from Charlottetown. This Sunday sailing is a regrettable innovation, a new thing in our shipping record and one which we feel sure the great bulk of our citizens will rightly regard with disfavor. Ships which sail on long voyages must necessarily continue on their way without stopping for the day of rest, but there is surely no need of a Sunday departure for a vessel crossing the strait from Prince Edward Island to Nova Scotia. No plea of necessity or of mercy can be urged in extenuation of this Sunday sailing that could not be urged in behalf of carrying on farming operations, the business of a factory, the merchandising of goods, or the marketing of produce on the Lord's Day.

What would be thought of the Steam Navigation Company if its fine boats which now ply across the straits during six days of the week, were to set up Sunday trips in addition? What would be thought and said were our farmers, merchants, factory men with one accord to set aside all restrictions of law divine and human and pursue their regular weekly callings on the day of rest? Would that be a good thing or a bad thing for the public health, morals and general welfare? To ask these questions is to answer them. The people of Prince Edward Island are not yet prepared to abolish the day of rest and adopt the European or the American Sabbath. This regular Sunday sailing is an offence against the public conscience of Prince Edward Island and we think the rebuke of the Alliance very justly reflects the prevailing sentiment among Island people.

We realize quite fully that it will be said there are other things done on the day of rest which are almost, if not quite as objectionable as the sailing of an excursion steamer on Sunday. Those who have little or no regard for the day of rest, or for the principles of right are often fruitful in excuses and reasons for innovations the tendency of which is to break down all moral restraints and

safeguards. Vice and wrong have succeeded in closely counterfeiting that which has already received the sanction of custom. But the steamer management in this case have conferred a poor compliment upon Prince Edward Island. Apparently somewhat regardful of public sentiment on the Nova Scotia side of the strait, they must make the point of Sunday sailing at an Island port among our Sabbath-keeping people. We believe this will be and ought to be resented.

YOUNG WOMAN DROWNED.

SYDNEY, June 17.—While bathing at Lungan beach, this afternoon Miss Ella Mills, aged 35, was drowned. She had gone out for a swim as had been her custom for the past few days and getting beyond her depth was drowned before assistance reached her. The body was recovered shortly after in a few feet of water, but life was extinct. Miss Mills belongs to Springhill and had been visiting at Dominion.

A KINDLY ACT.

HALIFAX, June 19.—Harry Brady of the Robb Engineering Works, Amherst, brother of the young man who accidentally shot Herbert Parr a week ago, did a kind act today. Understanding that she was in poor circumstances he sent to the widow of Parr one hundred dollars with many expressions of his deep sympathy. The magistrate had previously honorably acquitted Albert Brady, the brother, holding that the shooting was purely accidental.

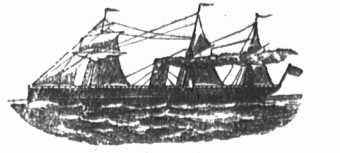
