

SECRETARY OF U. S. NAVY DANIELS THREATENS MARCONI CO.

WASHINGTON Sept. 23.—Secretary of the Navy Daniels, said yesterday that he would give the Marconi company today to give assurance that it would observe the naval neutrality regulations in the operation of the Siasconnet, Mass., wireless station.

Mr. Daniels Saturday served notice that unless the company would observe the department's rules, he would order the station closed to all communication. Counsel for the company has been quoted as saying that he would not make further answer to Secretary Daniels' communication, and would resort to the courts to determine the controversy.

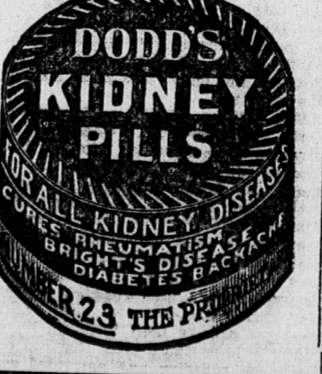
