LOUIS FRENCHETTE MONUMENT MOOTED

MONTREAL, Dec. 22. A monument to commemorate the achievements of Louis Frenchette, distinguished French Canadian journalist, poet and writer, is to be raised in St. Louis within a stone's throw of the home where Frenchette worked and died, according to present plans.

Shortly afterwards he was elected to the House of Commons at Ottawa but found little comfort in the turmoil of politics and was later appointed Clerk of the Legislative Council of Quebec.

In his leisure hours he wrote and published a variety of volumes of prose and poetry, a most important contribution being "Le Legendre d'un Peuple," issued in 1927. His works were well known in France where the French Academy awarded many mentions and decorations to the Canadian writer. Frenchette died at his home in Montreal on May 31, 1903.

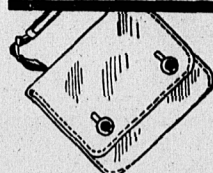
