Cumberland, Major Holland and their times. Next the old fort will be visited. Lastly the party will proceed to Holland Cove, where the remainder of the day will be spent in field work, study and recreation. SOUTH EASTERN ITEMS.—The wheat crop is said to be already proving a failure in some localities, although in these immediate sections, where the soil is light and porous, it is doing fairly well. Abundance of rain and warm weather is producing excellent pasture.—Mr. Ives' saw and door factory and steam mill at Montague is nearly completed. It is a large, splendid and commodious building and the promoter will no doubt receive the patronage his enterprise deserves. The boiler, which is a large one, was received a few days ago, and has been placed in position. There are a few more steam factories in these sections, chief among them being Mr. Murphy's, Murray River, and Mr. W. Emery's Belle River. Mr. Emery has gone very extensively into the manufacture of tobacco caddies, and besides doing a large amount of miscellaneous work, he makes quite a number of window frames, doors, etc., for Messrs. Poole & Thompson, Montague, and others.—The members of the Montague band held a concert in Heatherdale Hall, Thursday evening, 22nd inst.—Mr. John MacPherson, Brooklyn, Lot 61, is building at Murray River, and intends to enter the undertaking business there.—Communion services began in the Woodville Presbyterian Church yesterday (Thursday). The pastor, Rev. A. S. Stewart, is to be assisted by Rev. Messrs. Robertson and McL. Sinclair. Services are to be conducted in Gaelic and in English.—Lobster fishing continues to be very poor at Belle River and vicinity. It is said that a trot will be held on the Montague park in the near future.
