Brief Meeting Of Summerside Town Council

The regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last evening was very brief, with only routine business discussed.

In response to a petition of ratepayers, a resolution was passed on motion of Councillor Wedge, seconded by Councillor Gorrill, that early in the summer a cement sidewalk be constructed on the north side of Water Street, east, from Ralph and Jimmie's Grocery to the property of Keith Cameron.

Councillor Wedge, reporting for the Street Committee, said that all the streets are open and that the snow has been removed from the sides of Water Street. In the last day or two a Government plow had been available for the clearing the back streets. He complained of the lack of co-operation of citizens in leaving their cars parked on the streets overnight during storms. The plows start out between five and six o'clock in the morning, he said, and some time a car is going to be damaged by a plow. When a plow has to go around a parked car it means that the plow has to return and clear that particular place.

Mayor Arnett agreed and said the citizens should be more co-operative.

Councillor Morrison, for the Electric Light Committee, said that work was proceeding slowly on the installation of the new unit. This unit is very badly needed, he said, as the load is growing all the time.

Councillor Gorrill said it was intended to install fire sirens in the West and East Wards. A motion was passed that a sum of \$75.00 be voted to the firemen to assist them in holding their annual banquet.

Councillor Schurman reported that the Kinsmen outdoor rink is operating now and is proving very satisfactory. He felt that no mistake had been made in turning over this project to the Kinsmen.

HALIFAX, Jan. 12 (CP) - An early-morning blaze today roared through the Halifax branch of Metropolitan Store and Fire Chief

Fred MacGillivray said the building was "practically a total loss." The main floor of the department store was gutted and unofficial estimates put damage at \$75,000. The flames were confined to the one building on crowded Göttingen Street.

The blaze was discovered by a patrolling police constable in bleak, near-zero temperatures before dawn. No one was injured.
